We, the undersigned, are supporting the application of Mr Robert Radojcic of Fulham Kitchen @ 228 Munster Road SW6 6AZ to have a level playing field of opening hours with the neighbouring other licensed establishments (Locale, Convivium, L'Amour etc), specifically a 23:00 closing time, 7 days a week, <u>outside</u> to effectively curb the spread of Covid 19, protect local jobs, and allow affordable community conviviality in our locality. To that end we support the application to extend the hours, and we call on Hammersmith & Fulham Council and our local MP to:

- 1. support the extension of the current licence
- 2. to keep local jobs with affordable food and drink
- 3. deliver one of the few culturally diverse, community-centric meeting places
- 4. to help stop the spread of Covid 19 through use of the external spaces

Fulham Kitchen (previously Kafana and Monty's) has become a beacon on Munster Road over the last decade, a gathering place from breakfast through to evening for both Fulham locals and visitors alike, offering affordable food, beverages and a friendly, family-centric meeting place. Its clientele includes (but is not limited to), local tradespeople, retired gentlefolk, TV presenters, aspiring boxers, students, young and mid-life professionals, IT specialists, Olympic sports stars, international footballers, platinum selling music artists, authors, plumbers, national media journalists, business-people, traffic wardens, bankers, estate agents, aspiring politicians and those between jobs!

During lockdown other nearby licensed premises just locked their doors, took furlough payments and sat back counting the government subsidies – and they may or may not survive; Fulham Kitchen realised its vital place in the local community and local economy and worked within the government restrictions to stay open as much as it could – first as a take-away and then using the front terrace for seating a mere handful of people. This put a huge financial strain on the owners, but the huge take up is testament to its appeal of good, honest, home-cooked food of generous portions, including a fully vegan menu, and place as a community centre.

Fulham Kitchen has evolved into an open house attracting all parts of the community, from the Fulham 'born and bred' to more recent residents of all ages, to those just visiting Fulham; it supports local jobs and suppliers and brings together people from different generational, socio-economic, racial and ethnic backgrounds. It really is an extraordinary place, come and have a look. It has become a community focal point which fulfils a pivotal role for residents in the Munster Village area.

Fulham Kitchen is also well aware of its place in the local community and its potential to contribute. In particular, it has hosted charity fund-raising events for both Prostate Cancer and the Diabetes Wellness & Research Foundation.

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
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
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I have lived on Munster Road for 7 years and would like to express my support for Fulham Kitchen and object strongly to the restriction of opening hours which is not extended to other establishments in the proximity and I feel will adversely effect the feel of the neighbourhood.

As a professional living in rented accommodation, the appeal of this area is very much the blend of safe residential accommodations, and proximity to establishments such as Fulham Kitchen who provide a vital social link close to home.

Throughout the time I have lived here, I have not witnessed any antisocial behaviours related to Fulham Kitchen, nor excessive noise in relation to its customers or staff. It instead provides a convivial atmosphere in which to eat and has become a family favourite when visiting. Restricting hours will adversely affect workers such as myself who enjoy company over a meal following stressful and long shifts, often returning to the area between 830 and 9pm. As a healthcare worker, this has proved essential to supporting my mental wellbeing with no family in the area, social support cannot be underestimated. For the past 6 years, Fulham Kitchen has provided great food following these long shifts and restricting ability to choose to eat here amongst a safe and friendly atmosphere is unjustified.

The environment I have enjoyed on Munster Road is increasingly difficult to find across London and part of the attraction of young people living in and moving into the area. In particular for single females the ability to have a safe local social life close to home is essential, the diversity of patrons of Fulham Kitchen promotes a safe family environment, and multiple establishments open in the evening ensure footfall to deter criminal activity. Without this, greater travel and increasing vulnerability when arriving home would push many to avoid the area and increase vulnerability getting home at night. In short open businesses increase the feeling of safety in the city at night.

I thoroughly support the owners of Fulham Kitchen who have developed a friendly local business which supports life within the Munster Road area, encourages local spending, fosters a safe neighbourhood feel and is part of the appeal of this area in maintaining its community and village type feel.
