#### **Borough wide**

<u>Street harassment PSPO</u> - to reduce incidents of antisocial behaviour and improve the safety for all those who work, live or visit the borough.

<u>Alcohol consumption in public spaces</u> - borough-wide PSPO to support responsible alcohol consumption in public spaces.

<u>Responsible dog ownership protection order (PSPO)</u> - to support responsible dog walking in public spaces.

#### Area specific

Responsible street entertaining, busking and amplified speaking. Restrictions apply in Hammersmith Town Centre, Shepherds Bush, and White City.

<u>Thames Path PSPO</u> - to ban the use of motorised vehicles along the pedestrianised parts of the Thames Path.

# Public spaces protection orders (PSPOs)

#### What are PSPOs?

Public Spaces Protection Orders are powers introduced by local authorities (created by the 2014 Anti-Social Behaviour, Crime and Policing Act) to deal with particular nuisances or problems in a defined area that affects the local community's quality of life.

PSPOs can prohibit something or require certain things to be done, to ensure public spaces can be enjoyed free from anti-social behaviour.

# Why do we need PSPOs?

PSPOs are designed to balance the rights of residents and visitors to enjoy our public spaces with the need to tackle anti-social behaviour efficiently.

# Report a breach of a PSPO

You can report a breach of a PSPO to our Law Enforcement Team at <a href="let.hf@lbhf.gov.uk">let.hf@lbhf.gov.uk</a> or call us on <a href="leo.hgbf">020 8753 1100</a> and select option 3.

### **PSPO** enforcement

Officers able to enforce PSPOs include council officers (with delegated enforcement powers) such as the Law Enforcement Team, Police Officers and PCSOs.

# Penalty for breaching a PSPO

Breach of PSPO's will be dealt with by way of a Fixed Penalty Notice. An authorised person may issue a fixed penalty notice to anyone they believe had committed an offence. You will have 14 days to pay the fixed penalty of £100 (£60 if paid within the specified timeframe, see individual PSPO conditions for details).

The council works in partnership with the Metropolitan Police to enforce PSPOs across H&F.

## Areas where we can introduce PSPOs

We can introduce a PSPO on any public space within our authority.

The definition of public space is wide and includes any place where the public or any section of the public has access to, whether this is by payment, by right or by express or implied permission.

PSPOs apply to everyone when they're in an area with a PSPO in place.

# London Borough of Hammersmith & Fulham Harassment Public Spaces Protection Order 2024

The Council is satisfied that the two conditions below have been met, in that -

- activities carried on in the restricted area as described below have had a
  detrimental effect on the quality of life of those in the locality, or it is likely
  that these activities will be carried on in a public place and they will have
  such an effect:
- ii. the effect, or likely effect, of the activities is, or is likely to be, of a persistent or continuing nature, is, or is likely to be, such as to make the activities unreasonable, and justifies the restrictions imposed by the Order.

The Council of the London Borough of Hammersmith & Fulham, in exercise of its powers under sections 59 and 72 of the Anti-social Behaviour, Crime and Policing Act 2014 ("the Act") and all other enabling powers, hereby makes the following order:

- This Order comes into force on 11 November 2024 and ends on 11 November 2027 unless extended by further Orders under the Council's statutory powers. The PSPO will remain in place for a maximum term of 3 years, subject to any variation or extension.
- 2. This Order applies to all public spaces. This means areas of land which the public are entitled or permitted to have access (with or without payment) within the London Borough of Hammersmith & Fulham.
- The Order imposes that:

No person shall direct verbal or physical attention, including attention of a sexual nature, at or towards a person or group of persons where that attention is likely to cause a person or persons present harassment, alarm or distress or is likely to undermine their sense of safety in a public place.

Such attention includes – but is not limited to:

- Unsolicited sexualised or obscene comments, propositions or gestures
- Persistent questioning
- Following someone
- Sexist, homophobic or transphobic slurs
- Flashing or exposing intimate body parts
- Non-consensual physical contact
- Whistling or catcalling.

#### **Penalty**

Any person who fails without reasonable excuse to comply with any of the requirements in this Order shall be liable on summary conviction to a fine not exceeding level 3 (currently £1,000) on the standard scale.

#### **Fixed Penalty**

Police Officers, Police community Support Officers, the council's Law Enforcement Officers and other authorised personnel can issue Fixed Penalty Notices (FPN) to people who fail to comply with any of the requirements in this order. A person committing an offence will have 14 days to pay the fixed penalty of £100 (or £60 if paid within 7 days), failing which they may be prosecuted.

#### **Appeals**

Any challenge to this Order must be made at the High Court by an interested person within 6 weeks of it being made. An interested person is someone who lives in, regularly works in or visits the restricted area. This means that only those who are directly affected by the restrictions have the right to challenge. The right to challenge also exists where an order is varied by the Council.

Interested persons can challenge the validity of the Order on two grounds: that the Council did not have the power to make the Order or to include particular prohibitions or

requirements; or that one of the requirements of the legislation, for instance consultation, has not been complied with.

When an application is made, the High Court can decide to suspend the operation Of the Order pending the Court's decision, in part or in whole. The High Court can uphold, quash or vary the Order.

Dear Matt,
I am submitting the email trail below with our local MP, Ben Coleman, as supporting evidence for my original representation objecting to the application 2025/01088/LAPR by Amigo's to extend trading hours at 352 North End Road.
As a resident of SW6, I am extremely concerned that this application relates to a premises located within a <b>Met Police-designated crime hotspot</b> , in a densely populated and already overstretched neighbourhood. As recent incidents in the area have shown, the situation with <b>anti-social behaviour</b> , <b>noise disturbances</b> , <b>fireworks street crime</b> , <b>and loitering youth groups</b> has deteriorated to the point where resident no longer feel safe.
I respectfully urge the Licensing Committee to consider the <b>cumulative impact</b> on local public safety, noise levels, and quality of life for residents, and to reject this application for late-night trading and delivery.

I'm very sorry to hear about the appalling disorder in Haldane Road. This is wholly unacceptable. I've discussed it with the leader of the council, local councillors, the police and the Law Enforcement Team. They are determined to work together to address the problem.

As a first step, I've arranged a meeting tomorrow for Haldane Road residents with the police, the council's Public Protection Team and the LET to discuss immediate action to prevent a recurrence of Saturday's disorder, and to look at related issues.

Dear Mr Coleman,

My name is and I live on Haldane Road, SW6 7ET. I'm writing to you as a deeply concerned resident, after yet another terrifying and lawless incident this evening (20 September).

A group of teenagers set off fireworks aimed directly down our residential street, not into the sky, but straight along the road toward homes. They also threw a bicycle at a house. Several of us were outside speaking with the police, and the same group stood watching us from the end of the street, laughing, because they knew, as always, that nothing would happen.

This is not a one-off. This happens every weekend. We are dealing with:

- Regular drug deals in plain sight
- Fireworks used as weapons
- Street intimidation and loitering
- Noise and disruption from delivery drivers
- And a rising feeling that our safety simply doesn't matter

Despite reporting these incidents repeatedly to the police, there is little to no follow-up. The same faces return. There is no visible deterrent, and residents are growing increasingly anxious, frustrated, and vulnerable.

Personally, I have stopped walking home at night. I now take taxis home alone, even short distances, because I'm genuinely frightened. Many of my neighbours feel the same.

To make matters worse, this area is facing a surge in late-night licence applications, from McDonald's, Kaspa's Desserts, and now Amigos Burgers ,all within a few metres of each other, requesting hours well beyond what the council's own Licensing Policy recommends. These venues are encouraging late-night gatherings, deliveries, and street activity in what is still a largely residential area.

We are exhausted from sending objections, reporting crimes, and pleading for help. And yet the situation only escalates.

I am urgently asking for your support in:

- Raising this situation immediately with the Council and Met Police
- Demanding proper enforcement and a safety strategy for this part of Fulham
- Opposing any further late-night licences in this area until community safety is restored
- Standing up for the right of residents to feel safe in their homes and streets

Please help us. I fear that if this continues unchecked, someone will get seriously hurt — or worse. I feel like it's a matter of time someone will.

I've attached a short video from tonight's incident, which I hope gives you a clearer picture of the reality we're living with.

Thank you for taking the time to read this. I would welcome the chance to speak further or provide any additional information you might need.
