1. REVIEW APPLICATION

On the 4th September 2024, an application for a summary review of a premises licence under section 53A of the Licensing Act 2003 was served by Police Constable ("PC") Nicole Sondh, on behalf of the chief officer of the Metropolitan Police, Hammersmith and Fulham Police Station, 226 Shepherds Bush Road, Hammersmith, W6 7NX. The summary review application is in respect of the premises known as the McGettigans, 1 Fulham Broadway, London, SW6 7NX.

The application for a summary review of the premises licence was made on the grounds of prevention of crime and disorder, following an incident which took place on 1st September 2024 at the premises that concerned a female who had sustained a head injury, and then a short time later suffered a seizure. Further investigation established that there was a separate incident in May 2024 where a female customer was sexually assaulted, and police were neither called nor informed. The application was accompanied by a certificate issued by a Superintendent officer of the Metropolitan Police, certifying that they are of the opinion that the premises are associated with serious crime.

PC Sondh on behalf of the Metropolitan Police details in the summary review application that the failings presented by the premises in relation to the incidents raise concern with respect to how the premises is currently operating and their ability to uphold the licensing objectives, in particular the prevention of crime and disorder.

PC Sondh therefore requests that the licensing sub-committee ("the committee) consider a revocation of the licence.

3. BACKGROUND

Licensing records show that the initial premises licence was granted in respect of the premises on the 11th August 2005, On the 11th January 2016, an application to transfer the premises licence to McGettigans Holding 2015 Ltd was granted. On the 11th November 2021, an application to vary the Designated Premises Supervisor ("DPS") to Ms Deborah De Araujo Gomes was granted. A copy of the current licence can be seen on pages **72-86** of this report.

The main access to the premises is located on Fulham Broadway. There is a mixture of both residential and commercial premises within the area. A map showing the location of the premises and neighbouring licensed premises can be seen on page **87** of this report.

There are several options for transport away from the area including buses and taxis which run from in and around the Fulham Broadway area. Fulham Broadway tube station is a 2-minute walk away, Parsons Green tube station is a 13-minute walk away, and West Brompton overground station is a 16-minute walk away from the premises.

4. INTERIM STEPS

On the 05th September 2024, an interim steps meeting was held via Microsoft Teams. At the meeting, the committee decided, after taking into account all of the individual circumstances of the case, and the promotion of the four licensing objectives, to implement the following interim steps with immediate effect:

- Remove the designated premises supervisor from the licence,
- Suspend the licence pending the full review.

A copy of the full decision can be seen on pages **88-90** of this report.

On the 10th September 2024, Mr Duncan Craig of St Philips Chambers submitted a representation against the interim steps imposed on the 05th September 2024 on behalf of the current premises licence holder. A hearing was held on the 11th September 2024, and the committee decided to uphold the decision made in the original interim steps meeting held on the 05 September 2024. A copy of the representation, supporting documents and decision can be seen on pages **90-98** of this report.

5. CONSULTATION

A public notice was displayed by the Council at and near the premises. A further public notice was displayed by the Council at Hammersmith Town Hall. Details of the application were also published on the Council's web site.

A notice of review was served on the premises licence holder and all the statutory responsible authorities as required by regulation.

5.1 Relevant Representations

The licensing section received a representation from the Licensing Authority supporting the review application. A copy of this representations can be seen on page **100** of this report.

The licensing section received a representation from the premises freeholder El Group Ltd supporting the review application. A copy of these representations can be seen on pages **101-102** of this report.

The licensing section received one representation on behalf of the Barclay Road Conservation Area Neighbourhood Watch, one representation on behalf of the Fulham Island Residents' Association, one representation on behalf of the Vanston Place Management Company, and two from local residents supporting the review application. A copy of these representations can be seen on pages **103-113** of this report.

6. OTHER INFORMATION

6.1 Enforcement History within the last three years.

On the 10th January 2024, a warning letter was issued in response to a breach of the following condition:

 CCTV covering areas inside and outside of the premises shall be installed and maintained to police recommendations with properly maintained log arrangements. All images shall be stored for a minimum of 31 days. Appropriate signage shall be displayed, in a prominent position, informing customers they are being recorded on CCTV.

On the 24th November 2023, a warning letter was issued in response to unauthorised licensable activities ascertained to have taken place at the premises on the 19th November 2023.

On the 22nd February 2023, an inspection sheet was left at the premises as a warning letter in response to the following breach of condition ascertained during the visit:

 CCTV covering areas inside and outside of the premises shall be installed and maintained to police recommendations with properly maintained log arrangements. All images shall be stored for a minimum of 31 days. Appropriate signage shall be displayed, in a prominent position, informing customers they are being recorded on CCTV.

6.2 Temporary Event Notice ("TENs")

There have been seven TENs and four Late TENs approved in respect of this premises within the past twelve months. A copy of the list of TENs can be seen on pages **114-122** of this report.

7. POLICY CONSIDERATIONS

- 7.1 It is the Council's duty under the Licensing Act 2003 to determine the review with a view to promoting the four licensing objectives: Prevention of Crime and Disorder, Public Safety, Prevention of Public Nuisance and the Protection of Children from Harm.
- 7.2 In reaching a decision the Council must have regard to the Council's adopted Statement of Licensing Policy ("SLP") and the guidance issued by the Secretary of State under section 182 Licensing Act 2003.
- 7.3 The revised guidance issued by the Secretary of State under section 182 of the Licensing Act 2003 ("the Guidance") contains advice in paragraphs 11.16 to 11.29 in relation to the review of a premises licence and in paragraphs 12.01 to 12.35 in relation to a summary review of a premises licence. Paragraphs 11.16 to 11.29 and 12.01 to 12.35 of the revised guidance can be seen on pages **123-134** of this report.
- 7.4 The Council's own SLP gives guidance concerning the review of a premises licence.
- 7.5 Policy 10 pages 28 and 29 of the SLP in relation to reviews states that the Act describes two "groups" that may make representations to applications and may apply for an existing premises licence or club premises certificate to be reviewed by the Licensing Authority. These groups are Responsible Authorities and "Other Persons".

At any stage, following the grant of a premises licence, a Responsible Authority, such as the police or the fire authority, or other persons, may apply for a licence to be reviewed because of a matter arising at the premises in connection with any of the four Licensing Objectives.

A licence may be reviewed where it is alleged that the Licensing Objectives are not being promoted and there is evidence to show this. Guidance on grounds for a review are outlined in Annex 5.

At a hearing held to determine an application for a review of a licence the sub-committee may:

- a) Modify the conditions of the premises licence;
- b) Exclude a licensable activity from the scope of the licence;
- c) Remove the designated premises supervisor;
- d) Suspend the licence for up to three months;
- e) Revoke the licence.
- f) Take no further action".
- 7.6 Policy 11 pages 29 and 30 of the SLP in relation to the consideration of residents, expects that any licence applicant will give due consideration to the needs of Hammersmith & Fulham residents and any negative impacts from licensable activities and business operations.

Any review of a licence would need to be evidence based and as such is best supported by evidence from responsible authorities such as the Police or Environmental Health to be successful.

- 7.7 Policy 16 pages 33 and 34 of the SLP in relation to the safety of women and girls in licensed settings states that the Licensing Authority will use its powers to regulate the night-time economy, both with specific regard to spiking incidents and more generally in relation to violence against women and girls. This may include:
 - a) Using the Licensing Authority's powers to impose conditions or revoke premises licenses, where venues do not take sufficient measures to protect and provide support to customers in spiking incidents;
 - b) Considering the prevalence, prevention and reporting of sexual harassment and misconduct and gender-based violence in licensed premises.
 - c) Requiring the presence of suitably trained and accredited door staff,
 - d) Require presence of CCTV, or to introduce entry searches for example.

Licence applicants and existing licence holders are encouraged to include in their operating schedules clear polices relating to potential abuse or violence against women and girls.

This would include but is not limited to the 'Ask for Angela' programme, Welfare and Vulnerability Engagement' training package (WAVE) for staff to identify and assist women and girls being at risk or being subjected to violence, and the implementation of clear policies in the premises on preventing and addressing violence against women and girls. The Licensing Authority would also encourage off licensed premises to take part in the Ask for Angela scheme in an effort to increase the visible promotion of the scheme in all licensed premises across the borough.

Implementing these measures, particularly for on-licence premises, providing training for staff to increase awareness and provide skills and tools for identifying and assisting when it is at risk of happening or is happening, and having clear policies against violence against women and girls provide a solid basis for addressing the issue when it occurs in licensed premises. Furthermore, having policies on staff reporting incidents to Police and Council officers will help to ensure that these incidents are addressed.

As part of the Government's and the Council's Violence Against Women and Girls Strategy, venues may also wish to consider boosting their security measures e.g. the recruitment and training of additional door security staff, particularly female staff.

The Council are proud supporters of the Women's Night Safety Charter and we would like to encourage all our licensed premises to consider how you and your business can contribute to making your workplace and H&F a borough where all women feel confident and welcome whenever and wherever they happen to be. The Women's Night Safety Charter is a voluntary pledge to show you take women's safety seriously. By signing the Charter, you show your acknowledgement of the issue and that you're ready to get proactive in improving women's safety.

- 7.8 Annex 4 page 52 of the SLP in relation to the grounds for considering a review states that the Licensing Authority will regard applications for the review of any premises licence particularly seriously where they involve evidence of:
 - a) Use of licensed premises for the sale and distribution of drugs and the laundering of drugs money;

- b) Use of licensed premises for the sale and distribution of illegal firearms and the laundering of illegal firearms money;
- c) Evasion of copyright in respect of pirated or unlicensed films and music;
- d) Underage sales and consumption of alcohol;
- e) Use of a licensed premises contrary to any emergency legislation requesting its closure:
- f) Use of licensed premises for prostitution or the sale of unlawful pornography;
- g) Serious risks to children;
- h) Use of licensed premises for unlawful gaming and gambling;
- i) Use of licensed premises as a base for organised criminal activity;
- j) Use of licensed premises for the organisation of racist, homophobic, sexual abuse, attacks or any discriminatory behaviour;
- k) Use of licensed premises for storing or selling illegal alcohol or tobacco or smuggled goods;
- I) The use of licensed premises for the sale of stolen goods;
- m)Incidents of disorder;
- n) Instances of public nuisance where warnings have been disregarded;
- o) Serious risks to public safety which the management is unable or unwilling to correct;
- p) Frequently operating outside permitted hours.
- q) There may be legal implications if activity of child sexual exploitation (CSE) is taking place on licensed premises and there has been a failure to demonstrate due diligence or that adequate safeguards are in place this may lead to prosecution or any of the licensing sanctions detailed in the paragraph below.

8. THE REVIEW HEARING

In determining this application, the committee must consider what steps are appropriate for the promotion of the licensing objectives taking into account the application and any change in circumstances since any interim steps were imposed, consider any relevant representations, and review the interim steps already taken (if any).

In making its final determination the steps the licensing authority can take are:

the modification of the conditions of the premises licence;

the exclusion of a licensable activity from the scope of the licence;

the removal of the designated premises supervisor from the licence;

the suspension of the licence for a period not exceeding 3 months; and the revocation of the licence.

Modification of the conditions of the premises licence can include the alteration or modification of existing conditions or addition of any new conditions, including those that restrict the times at which licensable activities authorised by the licence can take place.

In making its decision, the Committee must act with a view to promoting the licensing objectives:

the prevention of crime and disorder

- the prevention of public nuisancepublic safety
- protection of children from harm

It must also have regard to its own SLP and the Guidance.

4. Details of association of the above premises with serious crime, serious disorder or both (Please read guidance note 2)

On Sunday 1st September at approximately 01:25hrs police were called by a member of the public to McGettigans, 1 Fulham Broadway, London,SW6 1AA following a fight where a female had sustained a head injury and then a short time after suffered a siezure. Upon attendance by police in the first instance security stated to police that there was a minor altercation inside the premises that had been resolved and there were no further issues. It was not relayed to police that the female suffering the seizure had also been assualted during the altercation. A short time later a second call was received by police from LAS (London Ambulance Service) who stated that the female paitient they were treating at the premises had a lump on her head, it has been suggested that this has been caused by either a bottle or a phone. Police attended again and this is where it has been confirmed that a fight has taken place inside the premises. No suspects had been detained or identified by security and there were no witnesses willing to speak with police. A scene was then put in place by police and the victim relayed to hospital where at the time she had remained unresponsive. Due to the injureis received an offence of GBH was recorded.

CCTV footage has been seen and retained it shows the fight however is not clear and the assault is difficult to make out, it is of poor quality. This is the only camera covering the incident and it is therefore apparent that the premises is not covered sufficiently and in particular where licensable activity is taking place, given that the incident takes place directly infront of the DJ Booth.

Police Licensing became aware of the incident on 02/09/2024 and a post incident form was sent to the DPS Deborah Gomes to determine their verison of events and the actions that had been taken by the premises during the incident and immediately after. The form was returned with no detail of the fight inside the premises and only explained the treatment provided to the female victim. Police licensing then arranged to meet with the DPS to discuss the incident further and also requested that the premises licence holder be present, Deborah explained that she was the only representative and did not provide a contact. Police Licensing then made contact with a representative who submitted an application in 2021 who referred police onto Mr Donal O'Doherty who explained that he manages the accounts for McGettigan Holding 2015 Ltd and this is solely owned by Mr Dennis McGettigan.

On Wednesday 4th September Police Licensing meet with the DPS, Deborah Gomes at the premises with Mr O'Doherty attending virtually. During this meeting it was still apparent that the DPS did not feel it necessary to have called police at the time and that the fight had not occurred describing it as pushing and shoving only, although admitting that the female had been hit during the alterctaion.

Whilst completing the licensing investigating it also transpired that at the time of the incident the premises was not opertaing in accordance with a licence. The premises licence allows the premises to trade for licensable activity until 01:00hrs on a Saturday night/Sunday morning. The premises had applied for a TEN for 31st August between the hours of 01:00 and 03:00, therefore these hours would have been authorised for trading in the early hours of 31st August. This was explained to the DPS who stated that she always applies for TENS this way and that it is a continuation of licensable hours. CCTV was viewed for the 31st August and it appeared that no event was taking place after 01:00hrs.

During the meeting Police Licensing asked to view the incident log for the premises to which they have a licensing condition to complete. It transpired from the the incident book that previous incidents had not been recorded and in addition to this incidents that had been reported had not been reported to police. In particular a sexual offence that occurred in May 2024 where a male has grabbed and groped a female outside the premises and then been allowed inside the premises to buy the same female a drink.

The failings presented by the premises in relation to the incident on 1st September causes concern with regards to how the premises is currenlty operating and their ability to uphold the licensing objective in particlar in the Prevention of Crime and Disorder. There is a serious concern as to why police were not called and were sent away and this has also been highlighted on a previous call received by police where police attendance was cancelled by security and then called back a short time later to reports of a fights, again no persons had been detained and no witnesses present. It is believed that the premises will continue to fail to promote the licensing objectives and will therefore be a risk to the public, we are therefore seeking revocation of the premises licence and the licence suspended pending a full hearing.

I am giving this certificate because I am of the opinion that other procedures under the Licensing Act are inappropriate in this case because:

(Give a brief description of why other procedures such as a standard review process are thought to be inappropriate, e.g. the degree of seriousness of the crime and/or disorder, the past history of compliance in relation to the premises concerned)

This case has come to light after a female was assaulted within the premises, the venue was cleared prior to police arrival losing any potential witnesses and not detaining any suspects. Further investigation found that during another incident a female was sexually assaulted and whilst the incident was logged police were not called or informed. Therefore losing any forensic opportunities or potentially identifying the offender at the scene. Despite training given to the venue staff there were no considerations for the victim's welfare or suspect detained. Officers have met with the designated premises supervisor and a representative for the licensee today but still believe that the issues are not resolved. As a result of this and other failings identified the police are seeking revocation of the premises licence and interim steps for the licence to be suspended and the Dps to be removed

I am the above named person and currently work for the Metropolitan Police Service as part of the Police Licensing Team covering the borough of Hammersmith and Fulham. My role includes consulting on premises licence applications including applications for new premises licences, temporary event notices, minor and full variations and any other applications that are linked to a premises licence. We will also monitor any crimes reported to have occurred within or as a result of licensable activity provided by a premises to identify any failings that may require further action from the premises or from police as a responsible authority. Our role is to work closely and effectively with premises and partnership agencies to ensure that the licensing objectives are promoted in particular in the Prevention of Crime and Disorder and in the Protection of Children from Harm.

The licence is held by McGettigan Holding 2015 Ltd and the Designated Premises Supervisor (DPS) is Ms Deborah De Araujo Gomes, who is also the general manager. The premises is located on Fulham Broadway, which is a busy road with constant traffic movement 24 hours a day, the venue is on the opposite side of the road to Fulham Broadway Tube station and a short walk from Chelsea Football Club.

On Monday 2nd September 2024 Police Licensing became aware of an incident of assault that had occurred at McGettigans in the early hours on Sunday 1st September 2024. The circumstances of the assault as read on the crime report were that during a private party that was being hosted by the premises a female had become involved in an altercation, during that altercation she had received a hit to the head causing a lump to the front of her head. Subsequently 15minutes later the same female had a seizure and the Local Ambulance Service were called. The female was treated at the scene by paramedics however had remained unresponsive and so she was taken to St Mary's Hospital for further treatment. Due to the severity of her injuries at the time an attending police officer accompanied the victim to the hospital acting as a continuity officer and a crime scene was placed at the premises. The incident was recorded as assault by Grievous Bodily Harm due to her injuries and the fact that she had remained unresponsive, it was unknown whether her injuries would be life changing or life threatening at the time. right due to the risk of harm associated, from a police licensing perspective it was further concerning to read that police had attended the premises on two occasions that evening. The first occasion to reports of a fight where it was relayed to them by security that the fight was in fact a minor altercation and had no relation to the female having a seizure, this was relayed as separate medical issue. Police were then called back to the premises a short time later by the London Ambulance service who identified that the female had possibly been assaulted prior to experiencing a seizure. Officers re-attended and this is where it has become apparent to officers that a little more than a minor altercation had occurred. A crime scene was placed at the premises and officers on scene conducted enquires with witnesses in order to piece together what exactly had happened. Witnesses were not forthcoming and suspects had not been identified or detained. CCTV had been provided by the premises which does not show the assault specifically however it does show that an altercation occurred that was merely more than minor as initially described by security staff at the premises. It was not clear on the crime report whether the premises had called police with regards to this incident. The crime report was updated detailing that the female had regained consciousness and her injuries were not life changing or threatening and that she had given a brief account of the circumstances. Crime ref 01/787246/24 relates and a redacted copy is attached exhibited as NKS/01.

Having read the crime report, concerns from a Police Licensing perspective were raised with regards to who called police, did the premises at all? Why when police initially attended were they not told that the female victim had been assaulted prior to suffering a seizure, this incident appeared to have been treated as a separate medical emergency. Showing either intentional deceit or a clear lack of understanding which falls below the expectation of the responsibilities of a licensed premises, questioning whether the Licensing objective in the Prevention of Crime and Disorder is being promoted by McGettigans.

As with all incidents on Monday 2nd December I sent through a Post Incident Report (PIR) form to Deborah Gomes via email asking for her to complete the form as a matter of urgency detailing her knowledge of the incident and the actions taken by staff at the time of the incident. Deborah returned the form to me the same day and its contents were unsatisfactory and disappointing to read. Deborah made no mention of the altercation that had taken place resulting in the injury to the female's head and instead spoke about the medical support provided to her at the time. She also alluded to the fact that the police investigation was closed and that the victim did not support police action therefore the case had been closed. This was not case and the investigation remains open at the time of writing this statement. Again this raised concerns with regards to the premises willingness to work with police and the intentional deceit with no mention of the assault or as she later described 'minor altercation'. A copy of the post incident report is attached and exhibited at NKS/02.

Not satisfied with the post incident report received I arranged to meet with Deborah on Wednesday 4th September 2024 at 13:00 at McGettigans to discuss the incident further. I informed her that I would be attending with my colleague PC Steve Muldoon, who is also a police licensing officer for the borough of Westminster. I advised Deborah to invite anyone who she may feel relevant to also attend the meeting.

the premises in relation to this incident. The following CAD (computer aided despatch) reports show how police became aware of the incident that occurred on 1st September 2024;

CAD 596/01SEP24 call received at 01:23hrs – male member of the public stating fight at premises. A redacted copy of this call has been attached and is exhibited at NKS/03.

CAD 603/01SEP24 call received at 01:25hrs – female member of the public stating 20 people fighting males and females. This CAD reported is updated by council CCTV operating room who state that there does not appear to be a fight occurring on the street outside and that it looks like the venue is emptying. Police update this cad report with the information provided by the venue about a minor altercation and a separate medical emergency. A redacted copy of this call has been attached and is exhibited at NKS/04.

CAD 610/01SEP24 call received at 01:25hrs from same number as CAD 596 listed above, member of the public stating multiple fights on the road. No further details provided. A redacted copy of this cad report has been attached and is exhibited as NKS/05.

CAD 762/01SEP24 call received at 01:54hrs from LAS asking for police assistance, as they are treating a female that has been assaulted with either a bottle or been punched. A redacted copy of this report has been attached and is exhibited as NKS/06.

CAD 848/01SEP24 created at 02:10hrs relates to the continuity report of the officers attending the hospital with the victim. A redacted copy of this cad report has been attached and is exhibited as NKS/07.

During my search I also came across two further CADS of note that raised further concerns. These reports did not result in a crime report and so were not addressed with the premises at the time, however do go some way to demonstrate a pattern of behaviour from the premises with regards to potential incidents of disorder not being reported or downplayed by the premises therefore hindering a police investigation into incidents of crime and disorder and increasing the risk of harm to the public.

CAD 711/27JAN24 – call received at 02:08hrs by member of staff at McGettigans stating that parties are arguing at premises and there is fear that the situation will escalate, whilst on the call security request to cancel police as the situation is now under control. Police attendance is therefore cancelled. A copy of the redacted CAD is attached and exhibited as NKS/08

CAD 737/27JAN24 – call received at 02:19hrs by member of the public stating that there is a fight in the street and that staff have lost control. When police attend no allegations are made and the two females suspected of fighting are not on scene. No crime reported. A copy of the redacted CAD has been attached and is exhibited as NKS/09.

In addition to historical checks I also watched the CCTV footage that had been provided by the premises showing the altercation. The footage is approximately 30mins long and shows a clear altercation occurring just in front of the DJ booth to the top left of the screen. The premises shows a high footfall with patrons sitting and standing drinking as well as those

dancing in front of the DJ booth at the top of the screen. Towards the bottom of the screen and to the right is the bar and opposite the bar on the left are the exits.

The footage shows the following;

At 01:10:25 an altercation can be seen can be taking place in the top left hand corner of the screen between males and females.

The altercation lasts for approximately thirty (30) seconds.

At 01:11:03 security can be seen from the bottom right of the screen to be walking towards where the altercation is taking place.

At 01:11:15 potential suspects leave the premises. Suspects were identified following the victims description provided later at hospital.

The altercation has been saved and exhibited as NKS/10.

Body worn video footage is also available showing the officers attendance to McGettigans in response to CAD 762/01SEP24 as detailed above. PC Walsh can be heard speaking with the head doorman of Mcgettigans, he asks the door man if this is the same female as earlier. The doorman confirms that it is and then later confirms that the victim was definitely assaulted. I have extracted this part of the footage and exhibit it as NKS/11.

Body Worn Footage is also available from the continuity officer, PC Buddin who attended the hospital with the victim. His footage shows the victim in a hospital bed with a large lump on the front of her head. During the discussion she confirms that she has been hit with an unknown object. I have extracted this part of the footage and exhibit the extract as NKS/12.

Having reviewed the above mentioned apart from the body worn footage it was deemed necessary that the premises licence holder also attend the meeting scheduled on Wednesday 4th September or at least a representative on his behalf. I contacted Deborah to inform her this and to ask for a contact for the premises licence holder. Deborah explained that she was the only representative and would relay any information back to the licence holder. I conducted checks on previous applications and found an email address for a Ms Simona Pricope, who had previously submitted an application for McGettigans. No longer working for the company Ms Pricope forwarded my email to Mr Donal O'Doherty who stated that he manages the accounts for McGettigans. McGettigans is owned by Mr Dennis McGettigan and he resides in Dubai as does his operations manager. I replied back to Donal explaining that we needed to speak with the licence holder and I was happy for him or a representative for him to attend the meeting virtually. Donal replied stating that Mr Dennis McGettigan could not be contacted and that he will be attending on his behalf.

On Wednesday 4th September 2024 PC Muldoon and I attended McGettigans to speak with Deborah in person and Donal O'Doherty virtually about the incident that occurred on 1st September 2024. Prior to this meeting however PC Muldoon had bought to my attention that the incident had actually occurred outside the hours of licensable activity. The premises is licensed to provide licensable activity on a Saturday until 1am on the following Sunday. Deborah had applied for a Temporary Event Notice for an extension of licensable activity for Saturday 31st August 2024 between the hours of 01:00hrs and 03:00hrs, this would in fact be an extension on her Friday trading hours and she was therefore operating not in accordance with her licence at the time of the incident. A copy of the TEN has been attached and is exhibited as NK\$/11. When this was brought to Deborah's attention she stated that she always applies for Temporary Event Notices in this way and that this was an extension of her

Saturday trading hours. CCTV was checked for the early hours of Saturday morning at 01:00hrs and the premises did appear to be closed and the TEN not in effect. I explained to Deborah that the TEN needs to be applied for the correct day and time, with the time being relevant to the 24 hour clock and not trading hours. She appeared to understand this and take this on board.

I then spoke with Deborah with regards to the incident, I referred to incident as a fight and Deborah replied 'What fight?'. She referred to the CCTV footage stating that there was no fight. I explained that the footage was not of the best quality to show the actual assault however it did show an altercation to which a female has been assaulted and subsequently suffered a seizure. Deborah agreed that the female had been assaulted, however stated that she had a seizure because she was epileptic, she did not appear to consider the possibility that they could both be linked or that the seizure could have been triggered by the assault. She was of the understanding that she and her staff had dealt with the incident appropriately and to the victim's wishes stating that the family did not want police to be called. It was reiterated to her that the consequences of the assault could have resulted in much worse circumstances, therefore demonstrating the necessity for police to be called and vital evidence obtained. By not calling police in the first instance or informing them on their first attendance, officers were not able to speak with vital witnesses and were not given the opportunity to trace/track movements of potential suspects leaving the premises via council CCTV systems.

We also asked Deborah why police were not informed of the assault on their first attendance and why security had not related the two incidents, she could not answer this.

With the knowledge that the incident occurred during a private event but that the suspects were not known to anyone attending, I then asked Deborah how she operates during a private function. She explained that people are given wrist bands. I asked whether the public and those attending the function are separated during the evening to which she replied no and that after 1am people will be given wrists bands to remain in the premises indicating the private party is also open to the public and anyone that is in the premises at the time.

PC Muldoon then asked to see the premise incident logs. Conditions 29 on the premises licence states the following;

29. The licensee shall maintain a record of incidents and any complaints received and retain the record for a minimum of 24 months. This record will include details of the incident and staff who dealt with it and in the case of complaints will include the complainants name, location, date, time and action taken.

Two incidents logs were produced, one which Deborah explained is kept behind the bar and one that appeared to be a security sign on sheet. There was mention of a third incident book referred to by Deborah as the 'red book' however this was not seen by 'police and was believed to be in the possession of the security company. Deborah confirmed that she signs off all incident entries and checks the after every shift. There were not many incidents logged in either log book, however an entry made in the security sign in sheet generated further concerns with regards to the premises ability to promote the licensing objectives. In May 2024 there was an entry relating to a sexual assault of a female, whereby she had been

grabbed and groped outside the premises by a male who was then allowed inside the premises to buy her a drink. Police were not called or notified on this occasion. This is a risk to the public where details of a potential suspect of sexual offences could not be retrieved or an intelligence report submitted in an attempt to prevent further incident and protect the public. Deborah was asked about this incident and could not recall it.

We explained to Donal and Deborah that we had significant concerns with management at the premises and their ability to promote the licensing objectives and prevent further harm to the public. They suggested that they would provide further training to staff and Deborah suggested that she would speak with staff to find out why they would not want to call police. It was explained to Deborah in Donal's presence that a little more than training would need to be done in order to allay police concerns. We were also informed at the meeting that McGettigans were in the process of transferring the premises licence to Deborah who was buying the franchise McGettigans.

The police confidence in the DPS, Deborah Gomes and her ability to promote the licensing objectives was diminished following the meeting on Wednesday 4th September. She showed a clear lack of understanding to the severity of the of the assault and stood by the fact that no incident had taken place that was significant enough to report to police, despite having to place an ice pack on a victim's head. The meeting had highlighted further incidents that had not been reported to police and a lack of compliance in relation to training that they claim to have taken part in in order to safeguard the general public attending their premises. There was no accountability accepted for the risk posed to the public by not reporting these offences to police and allowing them to take place in a licensed premises. The fact that the premises licence holder was not able to be contacted added to concerns around the management of the premises, therefore it was deemed necessary to submit an application for a summary review of the premises licence for the following reasons;

- Police no longer had faith in the DPS, Deborah Gomes and her ability to promote the licensing objectives in particular in the prevention of crime and disorder.
- Given that the premises was in the process of transferring the premises licence to Deborah, we also had little faith in the licence holder's ability to promote the licensing objectives. Whilst Donal stated he understood the severity of the incident that occurred on 1st September and what transpired during the meeting, he later called PC Muldoon asking to provide Deborah with further training despite us expressing our concerns in her ability to manage the premises.
- With police having no faith that incidents where significant harm is caused will be reported, the level of risk to the public is increased.

Following the interim steps hearing on 5th September and the appeals hearing on 10th September, there has been no development to allay police concerns. There continues to be a lack of faith and confidence in the DPS and our lack of faith and confidence in the premises licence holder was heightened during the appeal hearing on 10th September. The premises licence holder does not share police concern in the DPS ability and it would seem appears to support her continued employment at the premises despite viewing the CCTV of the incident and further incidents of note being brought to their attention. The absence of Police confidence in both the DPS and premises licence holder stems from the lack of understanding to the severity of the incident that occurred on the 1st September, the lack of

control and guidance that is currently given to staff in relation to reporting incidents, their ability to work with police in detecting and preventing further incidents and the risk that this poses to the public in not doing so. Our concerns are not with regards to the premises licence being in existence but as to who is operating the licence and their ability to promote the objectives. The Metropolitan Police are therefore seeking revocation of the premises licence.

On 31/08/2024, at approximately 1:09 AM, a 60-year-old female was hit in the head Unfortunately, the incident was not captured on CCTV. Immediate first aid was administered, including the application of an ice pack to the affected area.

Following the incident, we stop serving alcohol and the lights were turned on to assist with the situation. The victim, who has a known history of epilepsy, experienced a seizure approximately 17 minutes post-incident. A family member promptly called for an ambulance, which arrived on the scene to transport the victim to Queen Mary Hospital for further evaluation.

At the hospital, a CT scan was performed. Fortunately, the results indicated that the victim's condition was not life-threatening, and she was diagnosed accordingly.








Annex 1 - Mandatory Conditions

1. Mandatory Condition

- (1) The responsible person must ensure that staff on relevant premises do not carry out, arrange or participate in any irresponsible promotions in relation to the premises.
- (2) In this paragraph, an irresponsible promotion means any one or more of the following activities, or substantially similar activities, carried on for the purpose of encouraging the sale or supply of alcohol for consumption on the premises—
- (a) games or other activities which require or encourage, or are designed to require or encourage, individuals to—
- (i) drink a quantity of alcohol within a time limit (other than to drink alcohol sold or supplied on the premises before the cessation of the period in which the responsible person is authorised to sell or supply alcohol), or
- (ii) drink as much alcohol as possible (whether within a time limit or otherwise);
- (b) provision of unlimited or unspecified quantities of alcohol free or for a fixed or discounted fee to the public or to a group defined by a particular characteristic in a manner which carries a significant risk of undermining a licensing objective;
- (c) provision of free or discounted alcohol or any other thing as a prize to encourage or reward the purchase and consumption of alcohol over a period of 24 hours or less in a manner which carries a significant risk of undermining a licensing objective;
- (d) selling or supplying alcohol in association with promotional posters or flyers on, or in the vicinity of, the premises which can reasonably be considered to condone, encourage or glamorise anti-social behaviour or to refer to the effects of drunkenness in any favourable manner;
- (e) dispensing alcohol directly by one person into the mouth of another (other than where that other person is unable to drink without assistance by reason of disability).

2. Mandatory Condition

The responsible person shall ensure that free potable water is provided on request to customers where it is reasonably available.

3. Mandatory Condition

- 1) The premises licence holder or club premises certificate holder must ensure that an age verification policy is adopted in respect of the premises in relation to the sale or supply of alcohol.
- (2) The designated premises supervisor in relation to the premises licence must ensure that the supply of alcohol at the premises is carried on in accordance with the age verification policy.
- (3) The policy must require individuals who appear to the responsible person to be under 18 years of age (or such older age as may be specified in the policy) to produce on request, before being served alcohol, identification bearing their photograph, date of birth and either—
- (a) a holographic mark, or

- (b) an ultraviolet feature.
- 4. Mandatory Condition

The responsible person must ensure that—

- (a) where any of the following alcoholic drinks is sold or supplied for consumption on the premises (other than alcoholic drinks sold or supplied having been made up in advance ready for sale or supply in a securely closed container) it is available to customers in the following measures—
- (i) beer or cider: ½ pint;
- (ii) gin, rum, vodka or whisky: 25 ml or 35 ml; and
- (iii) still wine in a glass: 125 ml;
- (b) these measures are displayed in a menu, price list or other printed material which is available to customers on the premises; and
- (c) where a customer does not in relation to a sale of alcohol specify the quantity of alcohol to be sold, the customer is made aware that these measures are available.
- 5. Mandatory Condition
- 1. A relevant person shall ensure that no alcohol is sold or supplied for consumption on or off the premises for a price which is less than the permitted price.
- 2. For the purposes of the condition set out in paragraph 1—
- (a) "duty" is to be construed in accordance with the Alcoholic Liquor Duties Act 1979;
- (b) "permitted price" is the price found by applying the formula— $P = D + (D \times V)$

where-

- (i) P is the permitted price,
- (ii) D is the amount of duty chargeable in relation to the alcohol as if the duty were charged on the date of the sale or supply of the alcohol, and
- (iii) V is the rate of value added tax chargeable in relation to the alcohol as if the value added tax were charged on the date of the sale or supply of the alcohol;
- (c) "relevant person" means, in relation to premises in respect of which there is in force a premises licence—
- (i) the holder of the premises licence,
- (ii) the designated premises supervisor (if any) in respect of such a licence, or
- (iii) the personal licence holder who makes or authorises a supply of alcohol under such a licence;
- (d) "relevant person" means, in relation to premises in respect of which there is in force a club premises certificate, any member or officer of the club present on the premises in a capacity which enables the member or officer to prevent the supply in question; and
- (e) "value added tax" means value added tax charged in accordance with the Value Added Tax Act 1994.
- 3. Where the permitted price given by Paragraph (b) of paragraph 2 would (apart from this paragraph) not be a whole number of pennies, the price given by that sub-

paragraph shall be taken to be the price actually given by that sub-paragraph rounded up to the nearest penny.

- 4.(1) Sub-paragraph (2) applies where the permitted price given by Paragraph (b) of paragraph 2 on a day ("the first day") would be different from the permitted price on the next day ("the second day") as a result of a change to the rate of duty or value added tax.
- (2) The permitted price which would apply on the first day applies to sales or supplies of alcohol which take place before the expiry of the period of 14 days beginning on the second day.
- 6. Mandatory Condition
- (1) No supply of alcohol may be made under the premises licence-
- (a) at a time when there is no designated premises supervisor in respect of the premises licence, or
- (b) at a time when the designated premises supervisor does not hold a personal licence or his personal licence is suspended.
- (2) Every supply of alcohol under the premises licence must be made or authorised by a person who holds a personal licence.

7. Mandatory Condition

Where this licence includes a condition that at specified times one or more individuals must be at the premises to carry out a security activity, each individual must be licensed by the Security Industry Authority, with the following exceptions:

- a) premises where the premises licence authorises plays or films
- b) any occasion mentioned in paragraph 8(3)(b) or (c) of Schedule 2 to the Private Security Industry Act 2001 (premises being used exclusively by a club with a club premises certificate, under a temporary event notice authorising plays or films or under a gaming licence), or
- c) any occasion within paragraph 8(3)(d) of Schedule 2 to the Private Security Industry Act 2001.

Annex 2 – Conditions consistent with the operating Schedule

- 8. Alcohol shall not be sold, supplied, consumed in, or taken from the premises except during the above permitted hours and during the following permitted hours:
- (a) New Year's Eve, except Sunday, 11am until the start of permitted hours on the following day and on a Sunday 12 midday until the start of permitted hours on the following day.
- (b) On Saturdays when a match takes place at Chelsea Football Club, 11:00 to 01:00 the following day.
- 9. The above restrictions on the sale and supply of alcohol do not prohibit:
- (a) the taking of alcohol from the premises by a person residing there;
- (b) the supply of alcohol for consumption on the premises to any private friends of a person residing there who are bona fide entertained by him at his own expense, or the consumption of alcohol by persons so supplied;

- 10. On days when Chelsea Football Club are playing at home or on days when a Chelsea victory parade takes place, the premise shall not allow the sale of alcohol for consumption OFF the premises for a period of three hours before the advertised kick off time until two hours after match has been completed.
- 11. On days when Chelsea Football Club are playing at home or on days when a Chelsea victory parade takes place, the premise shall not allow any drinking, or provision of food, in any area outside the front of the premises for three hours before the advertised kick off time until three hours after the match has been completed.
- 12. All staff responsible for selling alcohol shall be trained in the requirements of the Licensing Act 2003 in the terms of the licensing objectives, offences committed under the Act and refreshed at least once a year. Staff shall sign to confirm that they have received and understand the training shall be retained and made available to the police or authorised officers of the licensing Authority upon request.


Annex 3 – Conditions attached after a hearing by the licensing authority

- 13. When the premises is open on any day when a football match takes place at Chelsea Football Club and Police have given at least seven days notice, the premises shall not use glass or glass bottles for three hours before the advertised kick off time until three hours after the match has been completed.
- 14. No alcohol shall be served prior to 11am on Saturdays when football takes place at Chelsea Football Club.
- 15. An additional hour before and an additional hour after the hours listed for alcohol sales and regulated entertainment shall be permitted as follows. Such additional hours shall be permitted on a maximum of 12 days in each calendar year. The additional hours shall be permitted only if written notice has been served on the Licensing Authority and the Police (giving details of the event) at least ten days beforehand. The police shall have the absolute power to veto and, if this power is exercised, no extension shall be permitted for that proposed event.
- 16. All entertainments shall utilise the in-house amplification system, the maximum output of which is controlled by the duty manager.
- 17. All speakers are to be mounted on anti-vibration mountings to prevent vibration transmission of sound energy to adjoining properties.
- 18. Signs shall be displayed instructing patrons to respect the neighbours and behave in a courteous manner.
- 19. The operator shall place its refuse outside the Premises in co-operation with the reasonable requirements of the Council's arrangements for refuse collection and disposal.
- 20. Illuminated external signage shall be switched off when the premises are closed.
- 21. Security lights shall be positioned to minimise light intrusion to nearby residential premises.

- 22. Alcohol shall not be consumed other than during the hours permitted by this licence for the sale of alcohol and during a 30-minute period immediately following the permitted hours.
- 23. No customer shall be admitted to the premises after 00.00.
- 24. The total number of persons on the premises at any one time shall not exceed four hundred and fifty (450), (excluding staff).
- 25. The licensee shall ensure that no sound emanating from the premises shall be audible at the boundary of or within any nearby residence.
- 26. Door supervisors shall be in place at the premises on Fridays and Saturdays from 20:30 until all customers have left and the premises are closed to the public. On days when a football match is taking place at Chelsea Football Club, door supervisors shall be in place from three hours before kick off, or from the opening time whichever is later. They shall remain until three hours after the match is completed, or until the premises is closed, whichever is earlier.
- 27. CCTV covering areas inside and outside of the premises shall be installed and maintained to police recommendations with properly maintained log arrangements. All images shall be stored for a minimum of 31 days. Appropriate signage shall be displayed, in a prominent position, informing customers they are being recorded on CCTV.
- 28. CCTV is to comply with Data Protection Act and is to be working and recording correctly when the premises are open to the public. A staff member from the premises that is conversant with the operation of the CCTV system shall be on the premises at all times that the premises are open to the public. This staff member will be able to show police recent data footage on request and burn off images with a minimum of delay.
- 29. The licensee shall maintain a record of incidents and any complaints received and retain the record for a minimum of 24 months. This record will include details of the incident and staff who dealt with it and in the case of complaints will include the complainants name, location, date, time and action taken.





Decision of the Licensing Sub-Committee ("the Committee") 05 September 2024

McGettigan's, 1 Fulham Broadway London SW6 1AA (the "Premises")

The Committee has considered an application for a summary review of a premises licence under section 53A of the Licensing Act 2003 ("the Application")

The Committee has considered the submissions made by the Police, both orally and in writing.

In reaching its decision, the Committee has had regard to the relevant legislation, the Secretary of State's Guidance ("Guidance") and the Authority's Statement of Licensing Policy ("SLP").

In summary, the Committee has decided, after taking into account all of the individual circumstances of this case, and the promotion of the four licensing objectives to implement the following interim steps with immediate effect:

- i. Remove the designated premises supervisor from the licence; and
- ii. Suspend the Premises licence pending a full review.

Procedural Matters

- 1. The Metropolitan Police, a responsible authority, submitted an application for a summary review of the Premises licence on the 04 September 2024, "the Application". On Sunday 01 September 2024, at approximately 01:25 hrs, the Police were called by a member of the public to the Premises following a fight where a female sustained a head injury and then a short time after that suffered a seizure. On 02 September 2024, Police Licensing became aware of the incident and a post incident form was sent to the Designated Premises Supervisor (DPS) of the Premises, Deborah Gomes, to determine their version of events and the actions that had been taken by the Premises during the incident and immediately after. The form returned contained no details of the fight inside the Premises and only explained that treatment was provided to the female victim. On 04 September 2024, Police Licensing had a meeting with the DPS, Deborah Gomes. Police Licensing, during their investigation, requested for the incident logs to review and it transpired that there had been previous incidents that had occurred which had not been reported to the Police. In particular, a sexual offence occurred in May 2024, where a male grabbed and groped a female outside the Premises and then had been allowed inside the Premises to buy the same female a drink.
- 2. Form 693, which contained the representations from Police Licensing, and Form 693A, a certificate under 53A of the Licensing Act 2003 were submitted to the Committee on 04 September 2024.

3. PC Nicole Sondh and PC Steve Muldoon were in attendance.

Reasons

- 4. In making its decision the Committee has taken into account all relevant sections of its SLP and the Guidance, as well as local knowledge.
- 5. The Committee was mindful that Section 4 of the Licensing Act 2003 imposes a duty on the Licensing Authority, when carrying out its functions to determine the application with a view to promoting the licensing objectives.
- 6. The Committee noted the concerns raised by Police Licensing on the basis of the prevention of crime and disorder. Police Licensing informed the Committee that they were made aware on Monday, 02 September 2024 of an incident where a woman was hit over the head and subsequently suffered a seizure. The Premises provided first aid, however, it was a member of the public that called the Police. When the Police first arrived, they were informed by security that there had been a minor altercation and a woman had suffered a seizure. It was not relayed to the Police that she had been assaulted so the Police left the scene. The Police were later called back by the London Ambulance Service (LAS) who informed them that the woman had a lump on her head, the woman had suffered a seizure and was unresponsive. The Police then set up a crime scene and an offence of Grievous Bodily Harm (GBH) was recorded. The victim was treated at the scene and then taken to hospital. The criminal investigation is ongoing.
- 7. Police Licensing were informed to investigate the Premises. The Committee noted from Police Licensing that the Premises failed to call the Police and did not provide the full details of the incident to the Police on their first arrival at the Premises. This meant that the Police were not given the option to detain the suspects. The suspects were able to leave the Premises without being detained. Further, the CCTV at the Premises did not fully cover the area of the incident which was another concern for the Police.
- 8. The Committee noted from Police Licensing that a post incident form was sent to the DPS, Deborah Gomes to determine their version of events. The form was returned to the Police without any details of the incident that had taken place at the Premises and only referred to the treatment provided to the victim. Police Licensing state they had a meeting with the DPS. Police Licensing stated that the DPS did not recognise that Police should have been called to the incident that had occurred on 01 September 2024. They did not recognise the severity of the incident nor the fact that the victim had a seizure and was unresponsive. This has raised a huge concern for Police Licensing about the Premises' lack of welfare and care for the public. Police Licensing stated that they have no confidence that that the DPS will be able to restore faith that no further harm will be caused to the public, should other incidents occur at the Premises. The Committee noted that Police Licensing are recommending that the DPS is removed, and the licence is suspended pending a full review hearing.

- 9. The Committee further noted from Police Licensing that when they were reviewing the incident logs at the Premises, it appeared there were three incident logs at the Premises. One log was called the red book, another log was attached to a rota and the third log was for the venue. The log for the venue only had one incident recorded which was the incident that had just occurred on 1 September 2024. The log attached to a rota had two incidents recorded, one of which was a potential sexual assault incident where a male grabbed and groped a female and then the male was allowed to buy the female a drink following the incident. Police Licensing and staff could not locate the red logbook. Police Licensing asked the DPS about the incidents in the logbooks. The DPS initially stated she does check the logbooks but when she was asked about the sexual assault incident, she was not aware of it. Police Licensing informed Committee that it was their opinion that the Premises was likely underreporting incidents that were happening at the Premises.
- 10. The Committee noted that there was a condition on the Licence which required staff to be trained under the requirements of the Licensing Act 2003. Police Licensing stated the Premises has 'Ask Angela' posters and were informed that the staff had received WAVE ("Welfare and Vulnerability Engagement") training. They stated that the staff are aware that they have to call the Police whenever a crime is committed at the Premises. The Committee noted that there was another incident where the Police were called by a staff member where staff had lost control of a situation during an incident. The security at the Premises told the Police that it was under control and that the Police were not required. However, about 20 minutes later the Police were called again as the staff were not able to control the situation.
- 11. The Committee took into consideration the concerns raised by Police Licensing about the lack of reporting of incidents, failure to notify the Police of incidents that have occurred at the Premises previously such as the sexual assault and the failure to recognise the severity of the incident that occurred on 01 September where the victim suffered a seizure as a result of an assault. The Committee stated that by failing to call the Police there was a failure to demonstrate understanding in promoting the Licensing objectives, specifically the prevention of crime and disorder.
- 12. Taking all the above into account, it was the Committee's considered opinion that the relevant interim steps to be taken and implemented immediately are to remove the DPS from the licence due to the poor management, not being aware of some of the incidents that had occurred, failure to promote the licensing objectives and to suspend the licence pending a full review hearing.
- 13. If the premises holder is unhappy with the interim step taken, they are entitled to make representations and within 48 hours of the representations, the Committee will hold a hearing to consider those representations.



On September 1st, I was working during an event at McGettigan's Pub. The event proceeded smoothly throughout the night, with customers behaving in an orderly manner. However, between 1am and 1:15AM, there was a disturbance at the venue, although I was unable to see clearly what transpired. The situation was quickly managed by the security staff and I knowledge that a lady had injury on her head. First AID was provided prompt. I would like to emphasize that this was the only incident during the event, which overall took place peacefully and without issues.

Dear Sr/Madam

My name is Deborah Gomes, and I am the General Manager at McGettigan's Pub, located at 1 Fulham Broadway, I am writing to provide a detailed account of an incident that occurred at our establishment in the early hours of September 1st.

During the event, I was in my office when I noticed on the security cameras that the staff was responding quickly around the DJ table. I immediately went to assess the situation. A member of the party informed me that a lady had experienced a minor seizure and had struck her head on the table. Her son, concerned about his mother, mistakenly thought she had been injured, prompting the security team to intervene and escort him outside for a calmer conversation.

To ensure the safety of all guests, I promptly stop bar service, music, and the lights were turned up until we could fully understand the situation. Around 1:21 AM, our first aid-trained bar staff provided an ice pack to the injured lady. When I offered to call the police or an ambulance, the family declined and chose to leave, stating that the woman had epilepsy and was accustomed to such episodes. Her daughter arranged for an Uber, and at that point, the situation was under control with no altercations.

However, at approximately 1:27 AM, the lady suffered a severe seizure but was quickly placed in a recovery position. The ambulance arrived at the premises at 1:35 AM, and they subsequently called the police.

The police attended the scene at 2.23 AM, and I provided them access to the CCTV footage. Unfortunately, we could not determine the specifics of the incident from the footage. No formal report was filed, as the family opted not to pursue any action, considering it a personal matter.

The police reviewed the CCTV and noted that the situation was de-escalated within 20 seconds, with no further incidents occurring. I remained on-site with the police until approximately 4:45 AM. The lady was taken to the hospital, where she underwent a CT scan, and fortunately, no damage was reported. She was stabilized and no longer in critical condition.


Officer P. Waish (Badge #4264) was the officer who handled this case, and I have relayed all relevant information to him. The case has since been closed.



<u>Decision of the Licensing Sub-Committee ("the Committee")</u> 11 September 2024

McGettigan's, 1 Fulham Broadway London SW6 1AA (the "Premises")

The Committee has considered the representations made by the Premises licence holder against the interim steps made by the Committee on 05 September 2024 to:

- i. Remove the designated premises supervisor from the licence; and
- ii. Suspend the Premises licence pending a full review.

The Committee has considered the submissions made by the Premises Licence holder, the Police, both orally and in writing.

In reaching its decision, the Committee has had regard to the relevant legislation, the Secretary of State's Guidance ("Guidance") and the Authority's Statement of Licensing Policy ("SLP").

In summary, the Committee has decided, after taking into account all of the individual circumstances of this case, and the promotion of the four licensing objectives to uphold the interim steps taken on 05 September 2024 with immediate effect as follows:

- i. Remove the designated premises supervisor from the licence; and
- ii. Suspend the Premises licence pending a full review.

Procedural Matters

- 1. Following the interim steps taken by the Committee on the 5th of September 2024 to remove the Designated Premises Supervisor (DPS) from the licence and suspend the Premises Licence pending a full review, the Premises licence holder submitted a representation against the interim steps to the Licensing Authority on the 10th September 2024. As per the guidance an interim meeting was requested to hear the representations against the interim steps taken against the Premises.
- 2. The Licensing Authority arranged a meeting for the 11th of September 2024 to hear the representations by the Premises licence holder against the interim steps taken.
- 3. Prior to the start of the meeting on the 11th of September 2024, a set of documents containing: a signed statement from the disc jockey Peter Martin who was playing on the 31st of August 2024, the night the alleged assault incident occurred; a statement from a member of staff, Tulio Marcus; a statement from the DPS, Deborah Gomes; and, a letter from the daughter of the victim of the alleged assault that occurred on 31st of August 2024 were submitted for consideration.

- 4. The DPS of the Premises, Deborah Gomes, the Barrister representing the Premises, Duncan Criag and Louis Stelling, the solicitor representing the Premises were in attendance.
- 5. PC Nicole Sondh and PC Kris Cardwell were in attendance, and were represented by their barrister, Claire Nevin.

Reasons

- 6. In making its decision the Committee has taken into account all relevant sections of its SLP and the Guidance, as well as local knowledge.
- 7. The Committee was mindful that Section 4 of the Licensing Act 2003 imposes a duty on the Licensing Authority, when carrying out its functions to determine the application with a view to promoting the four licensing objectives.
- 8. The Premises licence holder provided statements of some eyewitnesses and a letter from the daughter of the person who suffered a seizure at the incident that occurred on the 31st of August 2024. The disc jockey who was playing at the Premises on the 31st of August 2024 stated that the lady fell next to the table where he was playing, the security rushed to her aid and her son was worried about her, so the security had to calm him down. The staff member stated the event was proceeding smoothly until a disturbance occurred between 1:00am and 1:15am. He stated he did not see the incident clearly, but it was quickly resolved, a lady suffered an injury, and first aid was promptly provided. The DPS provided a statement that she was in her office when the incident occurred but promptly went to assess the situation and was informed a lady had suffered a minor seizure and struck her head on the table. The daughter of the woman who suffered the injury stated her mother has high blood pressure and suffers from seizures. She suffered a seizure and in response an ambulance was called. She stated her brother was not fully aware of the specifics and was upset, security stepped in to ensure her mother was ok.
- 9. The barrister representing the Premises Licence holder stated that they believe that no assault occurred on the 31st of August 2024. The barrister stated that they have been told by a Police Officer with badge number 4264, that the matter has not been actioned at all as there has not been any complaint. They have contacted the Police and raised several questions to which they are waiting for a response. The Premises licence holder's position is that an assault did not occur, and no assault charge has been brought. The Premises Licence holder's position is that the woman on the 31st of August 2024, was a person who had high blood pressure and suffers from epilepsy which led to her seizure. The Premise licence holder states that there was an incident that occurred on the 31st of August 2024 which led to pushing and shoving but did not result in an assault. The seizure suffered was independent of the incident that occurred, and there was no reason to involve the Police on the matter. The barrister stated that the Premises licence holder has been a

- responsible operator since the grant of the licence in 2015 and has not been subject to any enforcement action.
- 10. The Premises Licence Holder, in relation to the issue of Temporary Event Notice (TEN) issued extending the licensable hours of the Premises, stated they made the application for the TEN, filled in the correct form and contacted the Licensing Authority to confirm that the hours would be extended on the 31 August 2024. In relation to the sexual offence recorded in the incident book, they stated that the lady was a local customer and did not want to involve the Police. The man involved with the incident left the Premises after the bouncers took him out, apologised to the lady and left a paid drink at the bar. The Premises licence holder stated they have provided evidence to support the representations with the witness statements and the letter from the daughter. They state that no serious crime was committed, and the interim steps taken to remove the DPS and suspend the licence are not proportional to the incident that occurred.
- 11. The Committee noted from the Police who stated that the information provided which led to the decision on the 5th of September remains true, despite the representations from the Premises licence holder. The Police stated that the evidence does not follow that there was mere pushing and shoving, and that no fight or assault occurred at the Premises on the 31st of August 2024. The Police stated it was a member of the public who called them and when the Police responded, they were informed that a minor altercation had occurred. Further, it was the London Ambulance Service who called the Police back and informed them of the injuries suffered and informed the Police the injuries appeared to have been caused by a bottle or a phone.
- 12. The Police state that in order to promote the licensing objectives, the Premises should have taken a more proactive approach in relation to the prevention of crime. The Premises, however, are downplaying the incident and not willing to call the Police or notify the Police of incidents. It is the duty of the Premises to ensure that they are taking all the necessary steps to promote the licensing objectives. The Premises did not take prompt action and when the Police arrived, they were on the back foot in relation to being able to effectively investigate the incident, speak to people and take statements. The Police stated they reviewed the CCTV, and it does appear that a fight had occurred which was not mere pushing and shoving, even though the quality of the CCTV was poor. The Police state that the quality of the CCTV is a concern as it is not of the standard that a Premises seeking to promote the licensing objectives such as the prevention of crime and disorder.
- 13. The Police, in response to the Premises licence holder stating the woman who suffered a seizure has a pre-existing condition, states that the preexisting condition is irrelevant and does not excuse the fact that the woman was assaulted and received a blow to the head. The pre-existing condition of epilepsy may have exacerbated the extent of the injuries. The Police further stated that they gave the Premises a post-incident form which was returned with no details of the incident. Further, on the 4th of September 2024, the Police contacted the DPS, and the DPS stated they did not feel the need to

call Police on that matter. The Police stated that in relation to the TEN applied for, the Premises misunderstood the application. The TEN was to extend the licensable hours for the early hours of the 31st of August 2024 and not to extend the licensable hours for the 1st of September 2024. The Police state that this misunderstanding demonstrates the mismanagement of the Premises and their failure to comply with licensing objectives or comply with their obligations under the Licensing Act as a whole.

- 14. The Police further stated the concerns of the Police are reinforced by the lack of proactive approach for complying with the licensable objective of the prevention of crime as the Police noted that a sexual incident was not reported and another incident of a fight where Police was called but later cancelled by security. The Police stated that due to this this lack of reporting and the evidence that the incident on the 31st of August was more than mere pushing and shoving, it was appropriate to remove the DPS and suspend the licence. The Police state that if the interim steps are reversed, there is a risk that the Premises would continue to not report other crime and disorder incidents that happen at the Premises, as well as the DPS not acknowledging the need to report them to Police.
- 15. The Committee took into consideration the representations made by the Premises licence holder that no assault occurred during the incident that happened on the 31st of August 2024, and the explanation of the unreported sexual offence. The Committee noted the Premises licence holders position that the interim steps taken were not proportionate to the incident taking place. The Committee took into consideration the response by the Police who stated there was evidence of a fight which led to an assault where a member of the public called the Police. The Police stated there had been other incidents where the Premises should have called the Police, but the Premises has shown a lack of understanding of their obligations under the Licensing Act and has not taken a proactive approach in promoting the licensing objectives especially in relation to the prevention of crime and disorder occurring on the Premises.
- 16. Taking all the above into account, it was the Committee's considered opinion that the interim steps taken on the 5th of September 2024 to remove the DPS from the licence and to suspend the licence should remain in place pending the full review hearing.
- 17. A full review hearing has been scheduled to take place within 28 days of the interim steps taken and a final decision will made at the hearing.

We act on behalf of Ei Group Ltd. Our client is the long leasehold owner of these premises and we have received a copy of the application for summary review of the premises licence issued by the Metropolitan Police dated 4th September 2024.

We would be grateful if you would accept this letter as a formal representation on behalf of our client.

Ei Group Ltd owns around 4000 public houses in England and Wales. The vast majority of these premises are the subject of lease/tenancy agreements through which the tenant operates his/her/its own business out of our client's premises. The lease/tenancy agreement makes it clear that all operational responsibility for the premises lies with the tenant. McGettigan's is operated under a 30 Year Lease to McGettigan Holding 2015 Ltd, the premises licence holder, who has been operating these premises since January 2016.

The review papers relate to a serious incident, poor management practices and failure to provide the Police all the relevant information during the course of their investigation. Our client fully understands the Police's concerns which mirror their own. It is clear that the issues that having given rise to the review relate to poor management practices. The s182 Guidance issued to Licensing Authorities states at para 11.20, "In deciding which of these powers to invoke, it is expected that licensing authorities should so far as possible seek to establish the cause or causes of the concerns that the representations identify. The remedial action taken should generally be directed at these causes and should always be no more than an appropriate and proportionate response to address the causes of concern that instigated the review."

Our representation is that in these circumstances, an appropriate and proportionate response would be removal of the current designated premises supervisor.



We would be grateful if you could acknowledge receipt of this representation and advise as to the date of the hearing as our client may wish to expand upon it at the hearing.

Dear Licensing,

We write to support the licensing Review 2024/01401/LAPRR by the Metropolitan Police of the McGettigan's Public House's current licence 2023/00272/LAPR.

As local residents we are very concerned about the unfortunate state of three key licensed premises in our Fulham Broadway Town Centre;

- 1) McGettigan's,
- 2) the now former Redback (sold, then quickly closed; then into receivership, then squatters, and more) and
- 3) the Broadway Bar and Grill (continues to be temporarily closed).

For the Committee's information, we are very alarmed by the increased crime and disorder around us. As well, there is increased concern about public safety. The cumulative impact of all this is having a very negative effect on residents as well as businesses in the immediate Fulham Broadway area with its neighbouring residential properties.

Regarding McGettigan's, we are especially concerned about the welfare of female customers, as well as Premises Licence Holders who seem to take a frighteningly casual, and thus possibly quite dangerous approach to protecting their customers—this is a public safety issue directly relating to one of the four licensing objectives. Security staff turning away the Police, as described in the Review Application is unacceptable to us, as

neighbours. We count on the system of privately engaged SIA—approved security officers to be our neighborhoods eyes and ears, specifically in and around the Premises that they are 'guarding'. This does not seem to be the case at McGettigan's and we wonder who is actually reporting the lax attitude of the SIA security guards on duty that night—they turned away the police with casual comments—to the agency who supplied the SIA security guards on the evening in question. This should be pursued by someone or some authority. We cannot ask questions at hearings, but we hope that this specific concern is addressed at the hearing by a Responsible Authority.

Our Council Leader Mr Cowan has proclaimed many times, through many initiatives, that women must feel safe in our borough and especially in our three Town Centres. This was certainly not the case at McGettigan's, as described in the Review Application. Fulham Broadway needs a positive reputation for not only women who live in the area and frequent our local pubs, but also women who visit the area for a meal, a drink, a night out. Leader Cowan insists, and we support his efforts that women must be convinced that Fulham Broadway is safe, very safe.

This Review is the opportunity for the H&F Licensing Committee to take a proactive approach, to consider closure of the Premises for a time, and to require better management practices at McGettigan's, and if any capacity is available, for police to proactively make spot checks directly at the venue. We support the Police and thank them for calling this official Review of the McGettigan's premises licence.

If nothing else, the CCTV operation at McGettigan's needs possible updating or at least the lenses of the cameras cleaned on a regular basis so that the muddy footage reported in the Review Application is not a hinderance to Police in the future.

Residents are also concerned about the growing drug trade that is simple to observe directly outside of McGettigan's; just stand across the street for 10 minutes late at night. This includes observing handoffs between those standing in front of McGettigan's, either smoking or chatting, or just waiting, and delivery scooter drivers who park outside McGettigan's (on double yellow lines/the highway). As well, neighbouring roads are experiencing an increase in the number of drug deals witnessed, especially very late in the evening; the police are well aware of these problems with many reports filed by residents, photos given to police, vehicle registration numbers given to police etc.

As further background, we would ask the Committee to consider the cumulative impact in the immediate area of crime and disorder at pubs around us and inside premises such as McGettigan's. A holistic view is needed. Consideration of Cumulative Impact, as clearly set out in the H&F Licensing Policy 2022-27 allows for the Committee to consider this Review in the context of Cumulative Impact in this area of Fulham Broadway, ie on a case by case basis.

One pub (Broadway Bar & Grill) shut down in late 2023, reopened around Christmas but closed again and immediately attracted squatters. Owners Stonegate have taken back the license and have also been granted a shadow licence recently.

Another pub/club (The Redback) closed in March 2024 (RedCat pub group went into partial administration 28 March 2024) only to be stormed by illegal Unlicensed Music Events (UME), as well as squatters on 5/6/7 April. The Police led a operation by Neighbourhoods officers, Response officers and Territorial Support Group with three vans and 21 officers on 13 April 2024 at 21:00 to stop a further UME using Criminal Justice & Public Order Act 1994 power under Sec 63 to 65, recommending on the scene a S.35 to assist with moving the attendees away from the area, deter them returning to the venue to resume the UME and reduce crime based on the UME from the previous weekend.

From the 18 April 2024 a police-initiated Magistrate's closure order was in place for three months from mid-April, at the former Redback, 490-492 Fulham Road.

The lease has reverted back to the freeholder Ilona Investments with whom residents have been in direct contact regarding the poor state of the building facade, requiring netting to catch falling masonry etc—a public safety issue that apparently no authority is required or empowered to properly address.

In summary, we support tonight's Review Application of McGettigan's Public House especially as it relates to Police efforts to reduce crime and disorder in our immediate area. We also emphasise the grave public safety concerns that this Application raises regarding the safety of women in our immediate neighbourhood. We thank the Committee for their consideration of the cumulative impact that these problems create around us. McGettigan's is smack in the middle of Fulham Broadway; what goes on there has either negative or positive implications for our Fulham Broadway neighbourhood.

Thank you for your attention to these very important matters for residents in and directly around Fulham Broadway.

I write in my capacity as of the Fulham Island Residents' Association and on behalf of all the residents of Fulham Island.

Fulham Island comprises 32 flats, which are members of the Association, and a further 8 flats in Albion House (fronting Vanston Place), which are not part of the Association. We have approximately 80 residents ranging in age from 92 to 6 years of age, not including those in Albion House.

The Fulham Island site is bounded by two pedestrianised roads: Jerdan Place, Vanston Place and, to a degree Farm Lane as there is no through access on Farm Lane.

It is a very short walk from Fulham Broadway and, inevitably, both Jerdan Place and Vanston Place are used as cut-throughs from Fulham Broadway to North End Road and beyond.

We write to support the licensing Review 2024/01401/LAPRR by the Metropolitan Police of the McGettigan's current licence 2023/00272/LAPR, and wish to register our interest in the outcome of the Polices' review of the Licence to serve alcohol on the premises at 1 Fulham Broadway SW6 1AA.

We read the report from the police officer, PC Nicole Sandh (2438AW), with dismay. The police review report suggests that there is a total lack of engagement between the owner and resident manager of McGettigans and the local police, resulting in unacceptable behaviour both inside and outside the premises being totally disregarded by those in charge. This puts both customers, especially women, and the general public at risk.

The lack of supervision, records of incidents and liaison with the police is disturbing. And in direct contravention of their Licence: 2023/02072/LAPR.

Fulham Broadway presents many issues concerning drugs and alcohol abuse and this is exacerbated by the main public house in the local area seemingly totally ignoring their licence conditions.

It is very important that licensed establishments, wherever they are, conform to the local Councils' conditions, and we ask that those that do not, in the case of McGettigans, are severely reprimanded. Their non-conformity affects the safety of every local resident.

Unfortunately I am on holiday on the 2nd of October but would like to nominate to speak on my behalf at the Licence review hearing.

I have just been timed-out on the LBHF website and so am making my representation by email before dashing to a meeting. Please acknowledge receipt.

I fully welcome and support this application for licensing review 2024/01401/LAPRR by the Metropolitan Police of the McGettigan's current license 2023/00272/LAPR. I have lived at this address for 24 years and in the last 5-10 years have witnessed the cumulative impact of a significant increase in violence, danger to life, drug related crime, ASB, increased nuisance, crime and disorder generally, threats and dangers to and harassment of women of all ages and people intimidated to turn a blind eye both at McGettigans and similar venues nearby. The area (a crime hotspot) is intensely residential with many schools and public amenities, so I completely share the concerns of the Police.

This case is appalling and frightening. Concerns include ineffective or no conditions on the license, poor CCTV coverage and safeguards, weak (possibly dishonest) management, inexperienced and young (often terrified) staff, pressure on staff to cover-up and not report issues (to avoid poor or negative social media reviews and because they need to protect themselves), insufficient assessments, too many TENs easily granted for late night and extended hours which are harder to police when resources are already stretched, no contribution to the community from the site operators to engage with residents to address concerns and promote real safety initiatives. This is a real opportunity to set a gold standard or benchmark against which all other site owners, operators and license applicants can and should be measured. Surely that is good for the police, LBHF,

residents, women, parents, visitors to the area, the elderly, disabled, the emergency services and businesses who want to grow and thrive etc. Visible, real and recorded enforcement, accountability and compliance will reassure all stakeholders.

licence was first made and which were excluded then by reason of the prior issue of a provisional statement; and, in addition to the above grounds, a reasonable interval has not elapsed since that earlier review or grant.

- 11.13 Licensing authorities are expected to be aware of the need to prevent attempts to review licences merely as a further means of challenging the grant of the licence following the failure of representations to persuade the licensing authority on an earlier occasion. It is for licensing authorities themselves to judge what should be regarded as a reasonable interval in these circumstances. However, it is recommended that more than one review originating from a person other than a responsible authority in relation to a particular premises should not be permitted within a 12 month period on similar grounds save in compelling circumstances or where it arises following a closure order.
- 11.14 The exclusion of a complaint on the grounds that it is repetitious does not apply to responsible authorities which may make more than one application for a review of a licence or certificate within a 12 month period.
- 11.15 When a licensing authority receives an application for a review from a responsible authority or any other person, or in accordance with the closure procedures described in Part 8 of the 2003 Act (for example, closure orders), it must arrange a hearing. The arrangements for the hearing must follow the provisions set out in regulations. These regulations are published on the Government's legislation website (www.legislation.gov.uk). It is particularly important that the premises licence holder is made fully aware of any representations made in respect of the premises, any evidence supporting the representations and that the holder or the holder's legal representative has therefore been able to prepare a response.

Powers of a licensing authority on the determination of a review

- 11.16 The 2003 Act provides a range of powers for the licensing authority which it may exercise on determining a review where it considers them appropriate for the promotion of the licensing objectives.
- 11.17 The licensing authority may decide that the review does not require it to take any further steps appropriate to promoting the licensing objectives. In addition, there is nothing to prevent a licensing authority issuing an informal warning to the licence holder and/or to recommend improvement within a particular period of time. It is expected that licensing authorities will regard such informal warnings as an important mechanism for ensuring that the licensing objectives are effectively promoted and that warnings should be issued in writing to the licence holder.
- 11.18 However, where responsible authorities such as the police or environmental health officers have already issued warnings requiring improvement either orally or in writing that have failed as part of their own stepped approach to address concerns, licensing authorities should not merely repeat that approach and should take this into account when considering what further action is appropriate. Similarly, licensing authorities may take into account any civil immigration penalties which a licence holder has been required to pay for employing an illegal worker.
- 11.19 Where the licensing authority considers that action under its statutory powers is appropriate, it may take any of the following steps:

- modify the conditions of the premises licence (which includes adding new conditions or any alteration or omission of an existing condition), for example, by reducing the hours of opening or by requiring door supervisors at particular times;
- exclude a licensable activity from the scope of the licence, for example, to exclude the performance of live music or playing of recorded music (where it is not within the incidental live and recorded music exemption)¹⁰;
- remove the designated premises supervisor, for example, because they consider that the problems are the result of poor management;
- suspend the licence for a period not exceeding three months;
- · revoke the licence.
- 11.20 In deciding which of these powers to invoke, it is expected that licensing authorities should so far as possible seek to establish the cause or causes of the concerns that the representations identify. The remedial action taken should generally be directed at these causes and should always be no more than an appropriate and proportionate response to address the causes of concern that instigated the review.
- 11.21 For example, licensing authorities should be alive to the possibility that the removal and replacement of the designated premises supervisor may be sufficient to remedy a problem where the cause of the identified problem directly relates to poor management decisions made by that individual.
- 11.22 Equally, it may emerge that poor management is a direct reflection of poor company practice or policy and the mere removal of the designated premises supervisor may be an inadequate response to the problems presented. Indeed, where subsequent review hearings are generated by representations, it should be rare merely to remove a succession of designated premises supervisors as this would be a clear indication of deeper problems that impact upon the licensing objectives.
- Licensing authorities should also note that modifications of conditions and exclusions of licensable activities may be imposed either permanently or for a temporary period of up to three months. Temporary changes or suspension of the licence for up to three months could impact on the business holding the licence financially and would only be expected to be pursued as an appropriate means of promoting the licensing objectives or preventing illegal working. So, for instance, a licence could be suspended for a weekend as a means of deterring the holder from allowing the problems that gave rise to the review to happen again. However, it will always be important that any detrimental financial impact that may result from a licensing authority's decision is appropriate and proportionate to the promotion of the licensing objectives and for the prevention of illegal working in licensed premises. But where premises are found to be trading irresponsibly, the licensing authority should not hesitate, where appropriate to do so, to take tough action to tackle the problems at the premises and, where other measures are deemed insufficient, to revoke the licence.

Reviews arising in connection with crime

- 11.24 A number of reviews may arise in connection with crime that is not directly connected with licensable activities. For example, reviews may arise because of drugs problems at the premises, money laundering by criminal gangs, the sale of contraband or stolen goods, the sale of firearms, or the sexual exploitation of children. Licensing authorities do not have the power to judge the criminality or otherwise of any issue. This is a matter for the courts. The licensing authority's role when determining such a review is not therefore to establish the guilt or innocence of any individual but to ensure the promotion of the crime prevention objective.
- 11.25 Reviews are part of the regulatory process introduced by the 2003 Act and they are not part of criminal law and procedure. There is, therefore, no reason why representations giving rise to a review of a premises licence need be delayed pending the outcome of any criminal proceedings. Some reviews will arise after the conviction in the criminal courts of certain individuals, but not all. In any case, it is for the licensing authority to determine whether the problems associated with the alleged crimes are taking place on the premises and affecting the promotion of the licensing objectives. Where a review follows a conviction, it would also not be for the licensing authority to attempt to go beyond any finding by the courts, which should be treated as a matter of undisputed evidence before them.
- 11.26 Where the licensing authority is conducting a review on the grounds that the premises have been used for criminal purposes, its role is solely to determine what steps should be taken in connection with the premises licence, for the promotion of the crime prevention objective. It is important to recognise that certain criminal activity or associated problems may be taking place or have taken place despite the best efforts of the licence holder and the staff working at the premises and despite full compliance with the conditions attached to the licence. In such circumstances, the licensing authority is still empowered to take any appropriate steps to remedy the problems. The licensing authority's duty is to take steps with a view to the promotion of the licensing objectives and the prevention of illegal working in the interests of the wider community and not those of the individual licence holder.
- 11.27 There is certain criminal activity that may arise in connection with licensed premises which should be treated particularly seriously. These are the use of the licensed premises:
 - for the sale and distribution of drugs controlled under the Misuse of Drugs Act 1971 and the laundering of the proceeds of drugs crime;
 - for the sale and distribution of illegal firearms;
 - for the evasion of copyright in respect of pirated or unlicensed films and music, which does considerable damage to the industries affected;
 - for the illegal purchase and consumption of alcohol by minors which impacts on the health, educational attainment, employment prospects and propensity for crime of young people;
 - for prostitution or the sale of unlawful pornography;
 - by organised groups of paedophiles to groom children;
 - as the base for the organisation of criminal activity, particularly by gangs;

- for the organisation of racist activity or the promotion of racist attacks:
- for employing a person who is disqualified from that work by reason of their immigration status in the UK;
- · for unlawful gambling; and
- for the sale or storage of smuggled tobacco and alcohol.
- 11.28 It is envisaged that licensing authorities, the police, the Home Office (Immigration Enforcement) and other law enforcement agencies, which are responsible authorities, will use the review procedures effectively to deter such activities and crime. Where reviews arise and the licensing authority determines that the crime prevention objective is being undermined through the premises being used to further crimes, it is expected that revocation of the licence even in the first instance should be seriously considered.

Review of a premises licence following closure order or illegal working compliance order

- 11.29 Licensing authorities are subject to certain timescales, set out in the legislation, for the review of a premises licence following a closure order under section 80 of the Anti-social Behaviour, Crime and Policing Act 2014 or an illegal working compliance order under section 38 of and Schedule 6 to the Immigration Act 2016. The relevant time periods run concurrently and are as follows:
 - when the licensing authority receives notice that a magistrates' court has made a closure order it has 28 days to determine the licence review – the determination must be made before the expiry of the 28th day after the day on which the notice is received;
 - the hearing must be held within ten working days, the first of which is the day after the day the notice from the magistrates' court is received;
 - notice of the hearing must be given no later than five working days before the first hearing day (there must be five clear working days between the giving of the notice and the start of the hearing).

Review of a premises licence following persistent sales of alcohol to children

11.29 The Government recognises that the majority of licensed premises operate responsibly and undertake due diligence checks on those who appear to be under the age of 18 at the point of sale (or 21 and 25 where they operate a Challenge 21 or 25 scheme). Where these systems are in place, licensing authorities may wish to take a proportionate approach in cases where there have been two sales of alcohol within very quick succession of one another (e.g., where a new cashier has not followed policy and conformed with a store's age verification procedures). However, where persistent sales of alcohol to children have occurred at premises, and it is apparent that those managing the premises do not operate a responsible policy or have not exercised appropriate due diligence, responsible authorities should consider taking steps to ensure that a review of the licence is the norm in these circumstances. This is particularly the case where there has been a prosecution for the offence under section 147A or a closure notice has been given under section 169A of the 2003 Act. In determining the review, the licensing authority should consider revoking the licence if it considers this appropriate.

12. Summary reviews

- 12.1 Summary reviews can be undertaken when the police consider that the premises concerned are associated with serious crime or serious disorder (or both). The summary review process, set out under sections 53A-53D of the 2003 Act, allows interim conditions to be quickly attached to a licence and a fast track licence review. The provisions were inserted by section 21 of the Violent Crime Reduction Act 2006 and amended by sections 136-137 of the Policing and Crime Act 2017, including the addition of section 53D.
- 12.2 The powers apply only where a premises licence authorises the sale of alcohol. They do not apply in respect of other premises licences, or to premises operating under a club premises certificate. The powers are aimed at tackling serious crime and serious disorder, in particular (but not exclusively) the use of guns and knives. The powers complement the general procedures in the 2003 Act for tackling crime and disorder associated with licensed premises and should be reserved for the most serious matters which cannot be adequately or otherwise redressed unless urgent action is taken. Separate powers in the Anti-social Behaviour, Crime and Policing Act 2014 provide for the instant closure of premises by the police in some circumstances (in essence, disorder or nuisance). The consequent review of premises licences by the licensing authority is provided for by section 167 of the Licensing At 2003.

Application for summary review

- 12.3 Section 53A of the 2003 Act sets out who may apply for an expedited review and the circumstances in which it can be used. The application is made by, or on behalf of, the chief officer of police and must be made in the form which is set out in Schedule 8A to the Licensing Act 2003 (Premises Licences and Club Premises Certificates) Regulations 2005 (SI 2005/42).
- 12.4 The completed application must be accompanied by a certificate issued by a senior officer of the rank of superintendent or above. The certificate is a formal note which identifies the licensed premises and includes a signed statement by the senior officer that in his/her opinion the premises are associated with serious crime, serious disorder or both. This form is not prescribed in legislation. However, a sample form which forces may wish to adopt is published on GOV.UK.
- 12.5 The tests to determine the kinds of conduct that amount to serious crime are set out in section 81(2) and (3) of the Regulation of Investigatory Powers Act 2000. Those tests are that the conduct:
 - (a) constitutes an offence for which a person who is 21 years of age or over with no previous convictions could reasonably be expected to be sentenced to imprisonment for 3 years or more; or
 - (b) Involves the use of violence, results in substantial financial gain or is conducted by a large number of persons in pursuit of a common purpose.
- 12.6 There is no definitive list of behaviours that constitute serious disorder, and the matter is one for judgment by the local police. The phrase should be given its plain, ordinary meaning, as is the case under section 12 of the Public Order Act 1986 in which it is also used.

- 12.7 In deciding whether to sign a certificate, the senior officer should consider the following (as applicable):
 - The track record of the licensed premises concerned and whether the police have
 previously had cause to give advice about serious criminal or disorderly conduct (or
 the likelihood of such conduct) attributable to activities taking place on the premises.
 It is not expected that this power will be used as a first response to a problem and
 summary reviews triggered by a single incident are likely to be the exception.
 - The nature of the likely crime and/or disorder is the potential incident sufficiently serious to warrant using this power?
 - Should an alternative power be deployed? Is the incident sufficiently serious to warrant use of the powers in Part 4, Chapter 3 of the Anti-social Behaviour, Crime and Policing Act 2014, or section 38 of and Schedule 6 to the Immigration Act 2016, to close the premises? Or could the police trigger a standard licence review to address the problem? Alternatively, could expedited reviews be used in conjunction with other powers (for example, modifying licence conditions following the use of a closure power)?
 - What added value will use of the expedited process bring? How would any interim steps that the licensing authority might take effectively address the problem?
- 12.8 It is recommended that these points are addressed in the chief officer's application to the licensing authority. In particular, it is important to explain why other powers or actions are not considered to be appropriate. It is up to the police to decide whether to include this information in the certificate or in section 4 of the application for summary review. The police will also have an opportunity later to make representations in relation to the full review. In appropriate circumstances the police might want to make representations to the licensing authority suggesting that they modify the conditions of the premises licence to require searches of customers for offensive weapons upon entry. Under the powers in sections 53A to 53D, this could be done on an interim basis pending a full hearing of the issues within the prescribed 28-day timeframe or for an appropriate period determined by the licensing authority.
- 12.9 Similarly, the power could, where appropriate, be used to reduce the risk of injury caused by glass by requiring the adoption of a safer alternative (but see paragraphs 12.15 and 12.16 below). However, it should always be borne in mind that the aim of the powers is to provide a selective tool, to be used proportionately.

The licensing authority and interim steps pending the review

- 12.10 Within 48 hours of receipt of the chief officer's application, the licensing authority must give the premises licence holder and responsible authorities a notice of the review and should include a copy of the application for review and a copy of the certificate, and must also consider whether it is necessary to take interim steps (place temporary conditions on the licence). When calculating the 48 hour period any non-working day can be disregarded¹¹.
- 12.11 The licensing authority may want to consult the police about the steps that it thinks are

¹¹ This means that, for example, if the application was received at 3pm on a Friday, the 48 hour period would cover the remaining 9 hours on that Friday and the remaining 39 hours starting on the Monday morning (provided it was not a bank holiday). In this case the licensing authority would have to decide on interim steps by 3pm on the Tuesday.

necessary, pending the determination of the review, to address the immediate problems with the premises, in particular the likelihood of serious crime and/or serious disorder. The licensing authority may consider the interim steps without the holder of the premises licence having been given an opportunity to make representations. This does not, of course, mean that the licensing authority *cannot* afford such an opportunity if it thinks it appropriate and feasible to do so in all the circumstances.

- 12.12 The determination of interim steps is not a matter that may be delegated to an officer of the licensing authority. The relevant decisions are likely to be taken by a licensing subcommittee rather than the full committee. It should also be noted that there is no requirement for a formal hearing in order to take interim steps. This means that the relevant sub committee members can communicate by telephone or other remote means in order to reach a decision. A written record should always be produced as soon as possible after a decision is reached.
- 12.13 The interim steps that the licensing authority must consider taking are:
 - the modification of the conditions of the premises licence;
 - · the exclusion of the sale of alcohol by retail from the scope of the licence;
 - · the removal of the designated premises supervisor from the licence; and
 - · the suspension of the licence.

Modification of the conditions of the premises licence can include the alteration or modification of existing conditions or addition of any new conditions, including those that restrict the times at which licensable activities authorised by the licence can take place.

- 12.14 If the licensing authority decides to take steps at the initial interim stage:
 - the decision takes effect immediately, or as soon after it as the licensing authority directs: but
 - the licensing authority must give immediate notice of its decision and its reasons for doing so to the holder of the premises licence and the chief officer of police who made the application. The 2003 Act does not specify that the immediate notice has to be in writing. However, in an individual case the licensing authority may consider that the need for immediate communication at least initially requires a non-written approach, such as a telephone call. This may happen when, for example, the authority decides that the decision should have immediate effect. In such a case, the decision and the reasons for it should be explained clearly and in full to the licence-holder (or someone who may properly act for the licence-holder), and the call followed up as soon as possible with a written version of the decision and the reasons (for example, by email or fax) which is identical to, or not significantly different from, the version given by telephone.
- 12.15 The licensing authority, in deciding when its decision on interim steps should take effect, should consider the practical implications of compliance in relation to the premises. For example to comply with a modification of the conditions of a licence that requires employment of door supervisors, those running the premises may need some time to recruit appropriately qualified and accredited staff.
- 12.16 In addition, very careful consideration needs to be given to interim steps which would require significant cost or permanent or semi-permanent adjustments to premises which would be difficult to remove if the outcome of the subsequent full review was to withdraw

or modify those steps. For example, making structural changes, installing additional CCTV or replacing all glassware with safer alternatives may be valid steps, but might be disproportionate if they are not likely to be deemed necessary following the full review (or any subsequent appeal). The focus for interim steps should be on the immediate measures that are necessary to prevent serious crime or serious disorder occurring.

Making representations against the interim steps

- 12.17 The premises licence holder may make representations against the interim steps taken by the licensing authority. There is no time limit for the premises licence holder to make representations on the interim steps, although in practice this would at some point be superseded by the full review which would have to be completed within 28 days of the application being received by the licensing authority. On receipt of such representations, the licensing authority must (if the representations are not withdrawn) hold a hearing within 48 hours of their receipt. When calculating the 48 hour period, any non-working day can be disregarded. Where the licensing authority has already held a hearing to consider representations against the interim steps, the holder of the licence may only make further representations if there has been a material change in circumstances.
- 12.18 The licensing authority must give advance notice of the hearing to the premises licence holder and the chief officer of police. Given that these measures are designed to deal with serious crime and/or serious disorder on an interim basis only, the process is designed to avoid delay and, as such, significant portions of the Licensing Act 2003 (Hearings) Regulations 2005 (SI 2005/44) (which set out the usual processes governing the conduct of licensing authority hearings) do not apply in order to streamline the hearing process. One result of this is that the licensing authority cannot adjourn the hearing to a later date if the licence holder fails to attend at the scheduled time, as is the case under the normal review procedure. And as is the case with that procedure, the licence holder does not have to be present for the hearing to take place. In addition, there is no timescale for notifying the licence holder of the hearing under the modified process, providing the notification takes place before the hearing is held. However, it is imperative that the licence holder be given as much notice as is possible in the circumstances to afford the holder a maximum practicable opportunity to prepare for and attend the hearing. Licensing authorities should bear in mind that the usual principles of public law decision-making will apply to interim determinations, in a form that has regard to the statutory context of an expedited process.
- 12.19 At the hearing to consider representations against interim steps the licensing authority must:
 - consider whether the interim steps are appropriate for the promotion of the licensing objectives; and
 - determine whether to withdraw or modify the steps taken.
- 12.20 When considering the case the licensing authority must take into account:
 - the senior officer's certificate that accompanied the application;
 - the chief officer's representations (if any); and
 - · any representations made by the premises licence holder.
- 12.21 There is no right of appeal to a magistrates' court against the licensing authority's

The review of the premises licence under section 53C

- 12.22 The licensing authority must hold a full review of the premises licence and determine the review within 28 days after the day of receipt of the chief officer's application. There can be no adjournment of the hearing or delay in reaching a determination beyond the end of the 28 day period. This must take place even if the chief officer or other responsible authority and/or other person asks to withdraw their application or representation (as the case may be). At the review hearing, the licensing authority must consider what steps are appropriate for the promotion of the licensing objectives taking into account the application and any change in circumstances since any interim steps were imposed, consider any relevant representations, and review the interim steps already taken (if any).
- 12.23 In making its final determination the steps the licensing authority can take are:
 - the modification of the conditions of the premises licence;
 - the exclusion of a licensable activity from the scope of the licence;
 - the removal of the designated premises supervisor from the licence;
 - · the suspension of the licence for a period not exceeding 3 months; and
 - · the revocation of the licence.
- 12.24 Modification of the conditions of the premises licence can include the alteration or modification of existing conditions or addition of any new conditions, including those that restrict the times at which licensable activities authorised by the licence can take place.
- 12.25 The licensing authority must:
 - advertise the review inviting representations from any persons for no less than seven consecutive days, by notice as described in regulation 38 of the Licensing Act 2003 (Premises Licences and Club Premises Certificates) Regulations 2005 (SI 2005/42) and, if applicable, on the licensing authority's website (see regulation 38(1)(b) of the above). The relevant notices should be published on the day after the day of receipt of the chief officer's application.
 - advertise that any representations which the premises licence holder, responsible
 authority or any other person want the licensing authority to consider at the review
 hearing, should be submitted to the licensing authority within 10 working days of the
 advertisement of the review appearing.
 - give formal notice of the hearing no later than five working days before the day or first day on which the hearing is to be held to the premises licence holder and to every responsible authority.
- 12.26 A party shall give to the licensing authority a notice no later than two working days before the day or the first day on which the hearing is to be held stating
 - whether he intends to attend or be represented at the hearing;
 - whether he considers a hearing to be unnecessary.
 - whether he would like permission for any other person (other than the person he intends to represent him at the hearing) to appear at the hearing and, if so, explain on which points that person will be able to contribute.

- 12.27 The regulations relating to hearings are set out in the Licensing Act 2003 (Hearings) Regulations 2005 (S.I. 2005/44). They apply to final hearings under the section 53A(2)(b) in a similar way to hearings following closure orders under section 167 of the 2003 Act (it should be emphasised that the truncated version of the hearings regulations described in paragraph 12.18 above applies to interim hearings only). The issues they address include who can make representations and what those representations can be about. It is therefore possible for responsible authorities or any other persons to make representations in relation to any of the licensing objectives, not just crime and disorder. Similarly, where it is in the public interest, the regulations relating to the exclusion of individuals from hearings, or conducting the hearing in private, will apply.
- 12.28 The licensing authority must notify its decision and the reasons for making it to:
 - · the holder of the premises licence;
 - · any person who made relevant representations; and
 - the chief officer of police who made the original application.

Review of the interim steps under section 53D

- 12.29 The licensing authority's determination does not have effect until the end of the 21 day period given for appealing the decision, or until the disposal of any appeal that is lodged (see below information on right of appeal). To ensure that there are appropriate and proportionate safeguards in place at all times, the licensing authority is required to review any interim steps that it has taken that are in place on the date of the hearing and consider whether it is appropriate for the promotion of the licensing objectives for the steps to remain in place, or if they should be modified or withdrawn. The review of the interim steps should take place immediately after the determination under section 53C has been reached. In making its decision, the licensing authority must consider any relevant representations made.
- 12.30 In conducting the review of the interim steps the licensing authority has the power to take any of the steps that were available to it at the initial stage (see paragraph 12.13). Any interim steps taken at the review hearing apply until—
 - (a) the end of the period given for appealing against a decision made under section 53C (21 days),
 - (b) if the decision under section 53C is appealed against, the time the appeal is disposed of, or
 - (c) the end of a period determined by the relevant licensing authority (which may not be longer than the period of time for which such interim steps could apply under (a) or (b) above).

Right of appeal against review of interim steps decision

12.31 The licence holder or the chief officer of police may appeal against the decision made by the licensing authority concerning its review of the interim steps to a magistrates' court. The appeal must be made within 21 days of the appellant being notified of the licensing authority's decision and must be heard in full by the magistrates' court within 28 days beginning with the day on which the appellant lodged the appeal.


Right of appeal against final review decision

- 12.32 An appeal against the final review decision may be made to a magistrates' court within 21 days of the appellant being notified of the licensing authority's determination on the review. An appeal may be made by the premises licence holder, the chief officer of police and/or any other person who made relevant representations.
- 12.33 The decision of the licensing authority, following the review hearing, will not have effect until the end of the period allowed for appeal, or until the disposal of the appeal.
- 12.34 Where appeals are lodged both against the decision following the review of the interim steps and against the final determination, the courts may decide to consider the appeal against the final determination within the 28 day period, allowing the interim steps appeal to be disposed of at the same time.

Flow diagram of the summary review process

12.35 The following flow diagram summarises the process.
