SUMMARY

There are more than 3,000 residents on the waiting list for secure cycle parking facilities in H&F, many of whom have been on the list since 2020. To meet this demand, the Council is committing to provide an additional 500 cycle hangars. These will be rolled out over a 3-year period from April 2024 – March 2027, in line with available funding. A mini competition via Capital eSourcing was undertaken to secure one provider from the Waltham Forest Framework. It is recommended to award the contract to the highest scoring bidder, Cyclehoop Ltd.

RECOMMENDATIONS

 To award a call-off contract to Cyclehoop Ltd, via the Waltham Forest Framework, for the provision of up to 500 new cycle hangars over a 3-year period from 1 January 2024 to 31 March 2027, with an upper contract limit of £3m.

Financial Impact

This report recommends awarding a call off contract to Cyclehoop Ltd for the provision of new cycle hangars over a 3-year period from 1 January 2024 to 31 March 2027. The contract will allow for up to 500 cycle hangars (with an upper contract limit of £3m) in order to secure best value for money. However, orders will only be placed in alignment with available funding. The existing Environment capital programme includes £1m for the installation of new cycle hangars, with further additional funding expected to be confirmed over the three-year period (including sources such as TfL Local Implementation Plans (LIP), S.106 and the H&F green investment scheme).

Legal Implications

This report recommends that the Cabinet Member approves the award of a contract for the provision of cycle hangers to Cyclehoop Limited for 3 years at a cost of £3m. A previous report dated 22nd November 2023 approved a procurement strategy to run a mini-competition under the Waltham Forest Framework for the Supply and Associated Cycle Parking Equipment – Lot 4. The Council followed the ordering procedure set out under the Framework by running a mini-competition including applying the Services Award Criteria which is defined in the Framework as those set out in the ITT for the Framework (50 Quality/10 Social Value/40 Price).

The report must be submitted to Contracts Assurance Board for approval before being submitted to the Cabinet Member.

The decision is a Key Decision (see Article 12 of the Constitution) and must be submitted to Committee Services for publication on the Council's website.

The appropriate decision maker is the Cabinet Member.

DETAILED ANALYSIS

Proposals and Analysis of Options

- 1. There is considerable demand from H&F residents for secure, dry, clean roadside cycle storage and this procurement will meet current demand. Further, H&F declared a climate emergency in July 2019 and is committed to reaching net zero carbon by 2030. A key contributor to the poor air suffered in H&F is motorised road traffic. To encourage and enable residents to switch from driving to travelling short journeys actively, we need to help them store their bikes securely particularly residents with no outside space at their homes. This procurement enables us to meet the current 3000-strong waiting list and will, we hope, help bring about behaviour change in the way some residents travel short journeys.
- 2. We used the Waltham Forest Framework to procure Cyclehoop Ltd, and ran a mini competition between the only two suppliers on the framework.
- 3. We used the Waltham Forest Framework because it was a compliant route that had been used by a number of boroughs across London to successfully roll out large numbers of cycle hangar provision, and to meet significant resident demand in a timely fashion. The key benefit to using the Framework was ease of procurement through an existing, trusted channel.

Reasons for Decision

- 4. The Framework requires an evaluation split of Quality: 50% Social Value:10% and Price 40%
- 5. We also assessed units on how their aesthetic complements existing street furniture and improves local streetscape.
- 6. We wanted Social Value to include help to create hubs for inclusive cycle training which might be the provision of specialised cycles and training hours for disabled residents to use. This would enable a wider section of the local population to engage in cycling, offering them opportunities to learn how to ride and to gain more independence in their own personal transport choices.
- 7. The evaluation criteria is as follows:

8. The final ranking of the tender exercise is as follows:

9. The recommended length of the contract is three years with an option to extend if there is increased demand for cycle hangars and H&F provides commensurate budget.

Equality Implications

10. This provision of cycle hangars is anticipated to have a neutral impact on equalities.

Risk Management Implications

- 11. There is a reputational risk to the council should the cycle storage areas become unsightly due to damage or graffiti or become inoperable. This can be mitigated by regular checks on the condition of the cycle racks to make repairs or improvements.
- 12. There is legal and reputational risk to the council if cycles are stolen from the racks or damaged and that owners take action against the council. This can be mitigated by the addition of "at owners risk" messages.

Climate and Ecological Emergency Implications

13. Cyclehoop use a range of methods to lower their carbon footprint which include sourcing materials from within the UK and as close to London as possible, route planning delivery journeys to minimise miles and carrying the maximum load possible per journey, visiting sites for assessment by public transport or cycle, creating modular hangars where parts can be replaced and recycled rather than the entire hangar having to be removed/replaced, recycling all materials, providing hangars that will last up to 30 years before needing replacement, regularly auditing their supply chain, aiming to have all fleet electric by 2027, gaining ISO14001 in 2024 and B Corp shortly afterwards.
