Conducting an Equality Impact Analysis

An EIA is an improvement process which helps to determine whether our policies, practices, or new proposals will impact on, or affect different groups or communities. It enables officers to assess whether the impacts are positive, negative, or unlikely to have a significant impact on each of the protected characteristic groups.

The tool is informed by the <u>public sector equality duty</u> which came into force in April 2011. The duty highlights three areas in which public bodies must show compliance. It states that a public authority must, in the exercise of its functions, have due regard to the need to:

- 1. Eliminate discrimination, harassment, victimisation, and any other conduct that is prohibited under the Equality Act 2010
- 2. Advance equality of opportunity between persons who share a relevant protected characteristic and persons who do not share it
- 3. Foster good relations between persons who share a relevant protected characteristic and persons who do not share it

Whilst working on your Equality Impact Assessment, you must analyse your proposal against these three tenets.

General points

- 1. In the case of matters such as service closures or reductions, considerable thought will need to be given to any potential equality impacts. Case law has established that due regard cannot be demonstrated after the decision has been taken. Your EIA should be considered at the outset and throughout the development of your proposal, it should demonstrably inform the decision, and be made available when the decision is recommended.
- 2. Wherever appropriate, the outcome of the EIA should be summarised in the Cabinet/Cabinet Member report and equalities issues dealt with and cross referenced as appropriate within the report.
- 3. Equalities duties are fertile ground for litigation and a failure to deal with them properly can result in considerable delay, expense, and reputational damage.
- 4. Where dealing with obvious equalities issues e.g. changing services to disabled people/children, take care not to lose sight of other less obvious issues for other protected groups.
- 5. If you already know that your decision is likely to be of high relevance to equality and/or be of high public interest, you should contact the Strategy & Communities team for support.

Age	The decision to enact the provisional services is not considered to necessarily have a significant impact on any residents regardless of age. In terms of residents who may be elderly and have particular problems with the presentation of their waste, there is provision within the services to provide "assisted collections", e.g. collecting waste from a collection point outside of that agreed in the service specification. The survey work carried out on service user experience of the prototype service for wheeled bin and food waste collection (see Section 3) did not identify any specific issues that residents experienced based on their age profile. It may be that having a dedicated container within which to store waste would be considered advantageous as opposed to the current method of presenting sacks. However, as part of the work undertaken prior to the implementation of the services a full consultation will take place between relevant resident's groups, officers within Street Environmental Services and our new contractor. Disability	The decision to enact the provisional services is not likely to have a significant impact on disabled residents. In terms of disabled residents who may experience an accessibility issue which would present particular problems with the presentation of their waste, there is provision within the services to provide "assisted collections", e.g. collecting waste from a collection point outside of that agreed in the service specification. The survey work carried out on service user experience of the prototype service for wheeled bin and food waste collection (see Section 3) did not identify any specific issues that residents experienced based on disability. However in advance of implementing any new services there will be significant engagement with residents' groups, including any disability fora and the council's coproduction teams to identify whether the design and presentation of wheeled bin receptacles, food waste caddies, or reusable garden waste sacks may present any barriers to residents being able to access the services based on a disability and put in place the necessary available mitigations. Where changes to service provision are proposed officers will have due regard to ensuring that the information relating to service changes is accessible to people who may have issues accessing such information due to a disability. 	Officers from Street Environmental Services, Climate Change Team and Corporate Communications carried out a
	face-to-face survey of households within the pilot scheme area attempting to survey each of the properties receiving
	both wheeled bin and food waste collections (4200 approx.). The survey received 930 responses and was completed
	in October 2022.

Analysis of consultation outcomes	Part of the survey detailed in Section 3 included a free text response question asking residents whether they have found any difficulties in using the service effectively. Such examples might have included but not been limited to opening the food waste container, carrying waste to the wheeled bin, differentiating between the different containers. The responses to the survey did not identify any significant access barriers to access food waste and wheeled bin collection services on the basis of a protected characteristic or combination of protected characteristics. The exception was where one respondent noted their age (80 years old) and her difficulty in manoeuvring their wheeled bin.
