SUMMARY

This report seeks approval to award a contract for the provision of Local Healthwatch services for four years with two options to extend for further periods each of three years to the Preferred Bidder. The proposed contract will commence on 1st September 2025 and have an annual value of £110,000.

The Health and Social Care Act 2012 places a statutory duty on local authorities to commission a local Healthwatch organisation.

On 20th January 2025 Cabinet approved a Procurement Strategy for the recommission of the service. This report sets out the implementation of the strategy and explains the rational for recommending the award of contract.

Financial Impact

The recommendation in paragraph 2 above to award a contract for the provision of Healthwatch services to the preferred bidder will have an annual cost commitment of £110,000. The contract term which is effective from 1st September 2025 for an initial four years to 31st August 2029, will cost £440,000 and give rise to the following part year effects.

This 2025/6 cost commitment can be funded from the existing Third Sector 2025/6 general fund budget. Subsequent years will be subject to budget approval sign-off for the year(s) in question.

The option to extend an additional two times for a further three plus three years means that the potential lifetime cost of the contract would be £1,100,000

Legal Implications

DETAILED ANALYSIS

Background

- The Healthwatch Procurement Strategy was approved by the Deputy Leader on 20th January 2025 and recommended conducting an Open procedure procurement due to the relatively small market size.
- 2. The report recommended the contract be let with a predetermined annual contract sum of £110,000 to prevent tenders being received which would have exceeded budgetary provision.
- 3. The report recommended an evaluation methodology with a technical commercial ratio of 60:40. As the contract sum was predetermined the commercial evaluation of the bids would be based on contact hours provided and staff costs ratios.

Proposals and Analysis of Options

Option 1: Award the contract on the basis of the conducted procurement
This option is recommended as it fulfils H&F's legal and statutory requirements to
provide a local Healthwatch. A robust, transparent and lawful procurement has been
conducted resulting in the recommendation that the contract be awarded to the
Preferred Bidder. This option is recommended.

Option 2: Do not award the contract

The current contract expires on 31 August 2025. If the contract is not awarded there will be no Local Healthwatch Services and the council will be in breach of its statutory duty. This option is not recommended.

Procurement process and method

- 1. The chosen procurement route taken was considered the best and most compliant commissioning option to select a Healthwatch service in Hammersmith and Fulham.
- 2. The Procurement Strategy recommended using an open procedure procurement route. Tenders were evaluated using a quality/price ratio of 60:40 with the contract awarded to the tenderer who submitted the most economically advantageous tender (MEAT).
- 3. The contract is to be awarded for an initial term of four years with the council being entitled, at its absolute discretion, to extend the contract term twice for a further three years, making a maximum total contract period of ten years
- 4. A Contracts Notice was published on the UK's e-notification service, Find a Tender (FTS). https://www.find-tender.service.gov.uk/Notice/040261-2024 The opportunity was published on CapitalEsourcing, the procurement portal used by the council, on 3rd February 2025. On this date further notice of the procurement opportunity was published on Contracts Finder.
- 5. Tenderers were given from 3rd February to 3rd March 2025 to submit tenders. Two tenders were received by the closing date. Both tenders were first checked

for completeness, compliance and legality. As a one stage open procedure was being used, both tenders had to meet the requirements of a Qualification stage which assessed their general suitability, economic and financial standing and insurances held. This stage of the evaluation also ensured neither tender met the grounds for discretionary and mandatory exclusion from the procurement process. Both tenders satisfied the qualification stage of the evaluation which enabled their technical and commercial submissions to be evaluated.

Qualification evaluation

- 6. The Qualification envelope contains the Standard Selection Questionnaire. Only if a tender passes all elements of the Qualification envelope will the corresponding Technical and Commercial envelopes be evaluated
- 7. The Qualification envelope requires a tenderer to provide basic information about the organisation submitting the tender and be awarded a pass mark for the following sections:
 - Grounds for Mandatory Exclusion
 - Grounds for Discretionary Exclusion
 - Economic and Financial Standing
 - Technical and Professional Ability
 - Modern Slavery Act 2015
 - Insurance
 - Previous experience
- 8. Regarding the Economic and Financial Standing test officers have verified, using Creditsafe and submitted accounts, that tenderers do satisfy this test.

Technical evaluation

- 9. The Technical envelope required tenderers to submit method statements for evaluation. Social Value was exempt from this procurement.
- 10. The method statement areas for the technical response were:
 - Leadership and Decision Making (weighted at 30%)
 - Engagement, Involvement and Reach (weighted at 25%)
 - People (weighted at 20%)
 - Collaboration (weighted at 15%)
 - Influence and Impact (weighted at 10%)
- 11. Each method statement was individually evaluated by officers using a scoring matrix of 0 to 5 with the following ratings:
 - 0 unacceptable (fail)
 - 1 poor (fail)
 - 2 fair
 - 3 satisfactory
 - 4 good
 - 5 excellent

Commercial evaluation

12. The Commercial envelope required tenderers to submit costs for the number of staff contact hours per annum and direct staff costs ratio.

Reasons for Decision

- 13. Following a robust procurement and assessment process it is proposed the contract will be awarded to the provider who submitted the most economically advantageous tender (MEAT).
- 14. By awarding a four-year contract to the Preferred Bidder this will ensure the council adheres to its statutory duties to provide a local Healthwatch and the views of residents are fed into improving local health and care services.

Equality Implications

15. Healthwatch promotes and protects equality and human rights for everyone who uses health and social care services. They are committed to actively seeking the opinions of hard-to-reach communities, ensuring that their voices are heard, and their needs are addressed, as outlined in the service specification. They are subject to the Public Sector Equality Duty under the Equality Act 2010. Healthwatch ensures that their services are inclusive, equitable, and responsive to the diverse needs of the entire community

Procurement implications

The procurement process has been carried out under PCR 2015 regulations and has been supported by members of the Procurement and Commercial team. If approval is given, we will support the service in the completion of the award documentation.

An Award Notice will be required to be published via the Find a Tender (FTS) via the Council's capital ESourcing eProcurement portal, and obverse the standstill period before awarding the contract.

Contract standing orders require that any contract in excess of £5,000 be recorded on the Council's Contract Register in order to comply with Transparency Duties and in addition we are required under Public Contract Regulations to publish Contract Award Notice with the details of all contracts in excess of £30,000 (£25,000 ex VAT) on the governments Contract Finder.

A project must be created using the using the Council's capitalEsourcing eProcurement portal and then create a contract entry (and upload a copy of the contract). A named contract manager must be allocated to the contract.

All calculations of the criteria scoring and weighting have been collated and then checked by two members of the procurement team
